

THE COMMITTEE OF SAFETY'S WORK.

One Hundred Special Policemen to be Appointed. Mayor Authorized, Also, to Appoint Two Extra Policemen for Each Ward.

The Board of City Trustees met in adjourned session last night, Trustees Wachtel, Kent, Davis, Bragg, Devine, Leonard and Pennish being present, Leonard in the Chair.

Kent reported that the street at Third and W had been improved without putting in a culvert, and he moved that a culvert be put in by the Superintendent of Streets at that place.

Devine thought that someone ought to have known when the street was improved that the culvert was needed.

ORDINANCE APPROVED. Mayor Steinman sent in the following communication: To the Board of Trustees: I herewith transmit to your honorable body, with my approval inclosed thereon, Ordinance No. 1024, for the purpose of amending Section 10 of Ordinance Number 276 of the City of Sacramento.

Leonard said the ordinance required each saloon-keeper who wishes to run all night to make application to the board for such license. He hoped the board would not allow franchise to anyone who would give a license to an improper place.

WATERWORKS MACHINERY. Leonard offered a resolution directing the Chief Engineer to draft plans and specifications for such machinery as is needed to put the Water Works in good order.

AN ECONOMIC PLAN. Devine spoke of the water power running by the city, and he thought that competent engineers might be able to formulate plans that would enable the water to be pumped by water power instead of steam.

THE WEATHER. Rapid Fall in the Barometer—A Heavy Storm Threatened. The Weather Bureau reports show the highest and lowest temperatures yesterday to have been 52° and 42°, with fresh southerly winds and partly cloudy weather prevailing.

The barometrical readings at 5 A. M. and 5 P. M. were 29.74 and 29.50 inches, respectively. The highest and lowest temperatures one year ago yesterday were 52° and 50°, with 2.25 inches of rain, and one year ago to-day 54° and 40°, and no rain.

The rain fell yesterday afternoon was a trace, making 15.23 inches for the season, as against 8.05 inches to an equal date last season.

The river is stationary at 23 feet 5 inches. The barometer was falling quite rapidly yesterday afternoon, indicating the approach of a storm of considerable magnitude.

It was reported, however, that a fierce gale was blowing in San Francisco, and that it had been found necessary to tie up the ferry-boats, owing to the heavy sea running in the bay.

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




