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REWARD!

San Francisco, Oct. 12, 1894.

TO UNITED STATES MARSHALS, SHERIFFS, CONSTABLES, POLICE AND OTHER OFFICERS.

At or about 9:30 on the evening of October 11th the overland mail and express train No. 8 was stopped by robbers, about five miles west of Sacramento, in Yolo County, California.

The express car was robbed of about \$80,000 (fifty thousand dollars) in gold coin. The train men and express messenger were shot at several times to accomplish the robbery. The following is a brief description of the robbers, as near as known at present: One about six feet high, weighing about 200 pounds, the other about five feet nine inches, weighing about 170 pounds. Each wore linen dusters and masks and had their faces whitened. The Southern Pacific Company and Wells, Fargo & Company will pay a reward of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500) for the arrest and conviction of each of the robbers, and a total of five thousand (\$5,000) dollars for the recovery of the money stolen or a proportionate amount for any sum recovered.
