THE BIG LOCOMOTIVES

They Haul Immense Loads Over the Mountain Ranges. The monster locomotives recently purchased by the Southern Pacific Company to be used in hauling freight on heavy grades are proving successful. On Wednesday engine No. 2,010, hauling a train of seventeen loaded cars and a caboose, weighing in all 456 tons, experienced no apparent difficulty in crossing the Tehachas Mountains where the grade is 116 feet to the mile. Yesterday engine No. 2,011, drawing a train weighing 480 tons, passed over the Sierra Nevada Mountains to Truckee. The only trouble encountered was the heating of some of the journals, as the machinery is still new and stiff. The grade is the same as that on the Tehachas.
