Sample Trade in Wheat Quiet, Though Prices Are Moderately Steady.

Business in Barley Slow, Values Having a Soft Tone—Buyers Have the Advantage in Oat Market.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 1, 1895. Arrivals of Oats today included 1,100 ctns from Oregon. Movement is not active, and buyers have whatever advantage there may be to the situation.

The local merchandise markets are quiet. Vegetable receipts were light. Only two and a half chests of Strawberries came in, and they were poor. Potatoes of all kinds are firm. Butter is weak. Eggs are firm. Poultry and game unchanged. Citrus fruits in light demand.

BUTTER AND CHEESE.

The New Law Against Imitations to be Enforced.

The newly-appointed State Dairy Bureau has issued the following circular, which is of importance to every body:

The State Dairy Bureau hereby notifies the public that on and after May 1st it will proceed to the rigorous enforcement of the law enacted on the 6th of March, 1895, for the prevention of deception in the manufacture and sale of butter and of cheese.

The following are the principal features of the law: The coloring yellow of oleomargarine or other imitation product is absolutely prohibited. And the possession of, sale of, or offering to a patron for consumption of such imitation product when colored yellow is a misdemeanor.

The use of the words "buttering," "dairy," "creamery" or of dairy symbols in connection with the sale or advertisement of the imitation product is absolutely prohibited.

In the handling of the imitation product the manufacturer, the carrier, the wholesaler and retailer, peddlers, bakers, hotel, restaurant and boarding-house-keepers must comply with certain regulations as to the labeling of the packages, the specification by printed statement of the contents and the proper notification of the purchaser, consumer or patron.

Other provisions of the law invalidate a contract made in violation of the Act which prohibits the use of imitation products in charitable institutions, less than \$100 worth of labels and marks a misdemeanor; provide what is evidence of intention to violate the Act; authorize the State Dairy Bureau to make use of the search warrant; require the District Attorney to prosecute and the informer to receive half the proceeds of the fine.

The provisions of the law are enforced with a fund of \$12,000 for the enforcement of the Act. Violation of any of the provisions of the Act is a misdemeanor, and a first offense is punishable by a fine of not less than \$50 nor more than \$100, or by imprisonment for not more than thirty days; and subsequent offenses are punishable by a fine of not less than \$100 nor more than \$300, or by imprisonment from thirty days to six months, or by both.

The provisions of the law have been sustained in the highest courts of all the several States in which it has been enacted, as well as in the Supreme Court of the United States.

The failures for the past week are divided among the trades as follows: Five saloons, 7 general stores, 1 planing mill, 1 fish cannery, 1 millinery, 1 lumber dealer, 2 grocers, 1 hotel, 1 clothing, 1 book and stationery, 1 restaurant, 1 wholesale liquor, 1 drug, 1 dry goods, 1 upholsterer and 1 painter.

Weather Notes. The Weather Bureau reports show the highest and lowest temperatures yesterday to have been 69° and 48°, with fresh to brisk southerly winds and cloudy weather prevailing, with a light sprinkle of rain.

The barometrical readings at 5 A. M. were 30.1 and 30.15 inches, respectively.

The highest and lowest temperatures yesterday were 69° and 48°, and one year ago today were 58° and 44°.
