THE MORALS OF HYDRAULIC MINING.

At the foundation of the social compact lies the maxim: "So use your own as not to interfere with the use of that which belongs to another." Take away this maxim and the whole fabric of civil law would fall.

These considerations are elementary, but they are too often forgotten. The revival of hydraulic mining has been proceeded with in total disregard of every civilized conception of moral honesty.

Mining is not an occupation by which men live except in so far as gold is useful in the mechanical arts. To mine a substance which merely stands as the representative of a medium of exchange is not the creation of wealth.

In the recent campaign we were treated to nauseating doses of demagogic platitudes as to the desirability of mining in such a way as not to inflict injury upon any one.

THE INCOME TAX DECISION.

The decision of the United States Supreme Court in the income tax cases could hardly be more unsatisfactory. It presents the anomaly of a court affirming a position which gives the law partial effect by the votes of Justices who hold the entire law to be unconstitutional.

It is not probable that the people will be content to have the law enforced after this year in its mutilated condition, for it extends the very classes that should not be exempted under a uniform law.

That is to say, had the Justices who hold against the law as a whole refused on that ground to concur in part, the whole law would be operative to-day; but concurring in the constitutional objections raised in part, because to that extent four of the Justices meet the views of the dissenting jurists, the latter really put into operation the very thing they declare to be unconstitutional, and that is opposed to the spirit of the Constitution.

Under such circumstances it is unreasonable to suppose that the law will be allowed to remain upon the statute book, or that the people whom the court say must pay the tax will do so willingly, and with patriotic desire to support the Government by that means of raising revenue.

We may therefore look for a modification of the law or its abandonment on the reassembling of Congress next winter. In the meantime good citizens will bow to the decision, and what is lawfully demanded of them. The case will prove anew the exceeding flexibility of the American system, and demonstrate again that the American people can pass through peaceful revolutions without impairing the integrity of American institutions.

It will not be asserted in any respectable quarter that the court was influenced by any other than its convictions of what is the true interpretation of the Constitution. The bench is too greatly divided, too outspoken and frank in its declarations, and too vigorous in its language, to leave any room for doubt about its honesty of purpose.

As we feared would be the case, the grant of an unconditional armistice by the Japanese has been communicated to the people of China as an evidence of the weakness of Japan and its desire to surrender the advantages it has gained. It is barely possible that the Chinese Government has made this representation with the best of intentions, and as the most speedy means of harmonizing Chinese sentiment and unifying the country.

There is one instance at least in which the new woman refuses to avail of the plea of sex, while claiming political equality with man. A woman has been convicted of murder in Chicago and has been sentenced to be hanged, and the leaders in the woman suffrage movement on being appealed to say: "Let her hang. In the new woman movement we take the penalties of the law as well as the benefits that we claim should be extended to us."

We are glad that the entire government of the town of Florence has been turned over to women. It will give them an opportunity to demonstrate whether they have the capacity to conduct a municipal government successfully.



PURSUANT TO LAW AND TO THE RESOLUTION of the Board of Trustees of the City of Sacramento, adopted April 8, 1895, directing that the undersigned invite and will receive at his office at the southwest corner of Fourth and J streets, up to 5 o'clock P. M. Monday, April 15, 1895, sealed proposals or bids for the following street work, to be done according to the specifications posted and on file therefor adopted, to wit:

That a street in this city, from the east line of Eleventh street to the east line of Fifteenth street, (except such portion thereof as is required by law to be kept in order or repair by any person or company having railroad tracks thereon), be improved by removing cobbles and gravel, grading and laying a streetway of concrete six (6) inches in thickness, and with a top coating of bituminous rock not less than two and one-quarter (2 1/4) inches in thickness, grouted rock gutters, iron curbs at Twelve, Thirteenth, Fourteenth and Fifteenth streets, where not already done, some curbing will round corners, altering old catch basins at Thirteenth street, and constructing new catch basins at Fourteenth and Fifteenth streets, and all work to be done to the sewer with six (6) inch sewer pipe.

All proposals must be accompanied by a certified check payable to the order of the Mayor of the City of Sacramento, for an amount not less than 10 per cent of the aggregate of the proposal, or by a bond for the said amount, and so payable, and throughout as prescribed by law.
