THE SAN FRANCISCO TRAGEDY.

In times of great public excitement such as that now absorbing attention in San Francisco, because of the dreadful murders in the Bartlett-street church, the wise and discreet citizens are those who exert their influence to quiet and caution the public.

Circumstantial evidence is dangerous, but it is at the same time oftentimes the best evidence. Circumstances now point to young Durrant as the murderer of the two girls whose bodies were found in the church of which Durrant was an officer.

When the dispassionate examination of the courts has been undertaken we will be in a condition to judge with satisfaction of this man's guilt. That the ends of justice may be conserved it is therefore essential that no theories or testimonies be now advanced that will not bear the scrutiny of the law.

Two monstrous crimes have been committed; a man believed to be guilty of them is in the clutch of the law; that his guilt may be the better established, therefore, it is essential that no fanciful tales be given out.

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CONCERNING WEATHER AND CROPS.

Summary of the Bulletins Received Last Week.

Weather Service Director Barwick Reports a Deficiency of Rain—Crops Doing Well.

Director Barwick of the State Weather Service reports as follows for the week ending yesterday: The average temperature for the week ending Monday, April 15th, was: For Sacramento, Fresno, Independence, Los Angeles, Red Bluff, Sacramento, San Francisco and San Diego 54°, respectively, and San Luis Obispo 57°.

As compared with the normal precipitation, there is a deficiency reported at all points except Eureka, where an excess of .2 of an inch has occurred. The weekly deficiency is: For Fresno .24, Sacramento .55, San Francisco .42 and San Diego .14 of an inch, and Independence a trace.

The total precipitation for the week was: At Eureka 1.1 inches, Fresno, Los Angeles, San Francisco, San Luis Obispo and San Diego each .10 of an inch, Sacramento .14 of an inch, and Independence a trace.

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The deficiency in temperature over the great agricultural, horticultural and viticultural districts of the State have had a retarding effect on the ripening of early fruits and berries.

The deficiency in the rainfall has been felt over the great portions of the State, for without crop and large number of orchards have suffered badly.

Mendocino—Hop pruning well under way, but the fruit outlook is not very encouraging, there having been too many severe frosts, and a large number of orchards have suffered badly.

San Joaquin Valley—Weather favorable to growing grain, fruit promising. Apples injured by frost and some other crops, cherries, prunes and pears slightly above the average.

Yuba County—Weather favorable to growing grain, fruit promising. Apples injured by frost and some other crops, cherries, prunes and pears slightly above the average.

Colusa—Grain on high ground looking well, and fruit of all kinds give promise of a good yield, there having been no damage from frost.

Yolo—Grain crop looks well, and fruit-growers say while certain varieties may be light, the crop is a heavy one compared for a heavy crop of other varieties.

Solano—Late frosts did considerable damage in the grain fields and other portions escaped with very slight effect from the frost.

Sacramento—Grain advancing rapidly and promises well. Apricot crop small, and Bartlett pears are not blooming as early as last year.

San Joaquin County—Weather favorable to all crops, early sown, barley heading; hay and alfalfa crops are dropping to some extent.

Fresno—Weather favorable for all crops, and with a few showers an immense crop of alfalfa is being put out.

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

NOTICE TO WATER-TAKERS. ORDINANCE No. 348. Providing for the Collection of Water Rates and Providing a Penalty for the Violation Thereof.

THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE City of Sacramento ordains as follows: Section 1. All water rates shall be collected from the owners of the premises to which water is supplied by the city. Provided, however, that the collector of water rates may authorize the collection of water rates from the occupant of business premises, providing the owner of the premises furnishes good and sufficient bond in a sum equal to one year's water rate, and same to be filed in the office of the City Collector.

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
