

SUSPENSION OF POLICE OFFICERS.

A Duty That Belongs Only to the Mayor. In accordance with the action of the City Trustees on Thursday night, Corporation Counsel Devin yesterday addressed to Mayor Steinman a written opinion on the question as to who has the right to suspend police officers.

Corporation Counsel Devin So Holds—What the Charter Says on the Subject. In accordance with the action of the City Trustees on Thursday night, Corporation Counsel R. T. Devin yesterday addressed to Mayor Steinman a written opinion on the question as to who has the right to suspend police officers.

That the Chief of Police shall have power to suspend any policeman for disobedience of any lawful order, for the violation of the rules of the department, neglect of duty, drunkenness or misconduct as a policeman, and he shall, upon suspending a policeman, promptly certify the fact, with the cause thereof, to the Mayor, who shall forthwith report the same in writing, together with the charges preferred against such policeman, to the Board of Trustees, and if such policeman be found guilty by the board, he shall be dismissed from the police force.

That the Mayor shall have the power to suspend any city officer (except a member of the Board of Trustees) for a dereliction, neglect or non-performance of duty, and shall report the same to the Board of Trustees. By virtue of these provisions it is your duty, in writing, together with the charges preferred against such policeman, to the Board of Trustees, and if such policeman be found guilty by the board, he shall be dismissed from the police force.
