SHOULD NOT BE DISCRIMINATION.

Bicycles Ought to Come Under General Regulations.

Fast Riding or Driving Should Not Be Allowed, and all Classes Treated Alike.

In connection with the matter of the recent arrests of bicycle riders for violating the ordinance regulating the use of wheels, there are some things that should be considered, especially as it has been hinted that the City Trustees may, because of the horn-and-bell demonstration the other night, be moved to impose more restrictive measures against the use of wheels.

In the first place, bicycles should be classed with other vehicles and the users thereof accorded the same privileges as the users of other vehicles of locomotion. There is a law against fast driving on the public streets, and it should apply to bicycles as well as to horses and buggies.

It is not always enforced against buggies, etc., and only recently against the fast riding of horses, and this because the Humane Society took action in the matter. The police should show as much zeal in one case as in the other, and if the speed of bicycles is to be restricted, it should be the officers should have eyes for bicyclists only, but should be just as energetic in looking after the drivers of other vehicles.

He is organizing the colored people to fight for the repeal of what he calls California 'black law,' which prohibits the intermarriage of white and colored people, and asserts that there are 200 white and colored people married by secret contracts. These marriages can never be proved up and the children legitimized unless the law is repealed."
