The deceased left an estate consisting of the northeast quarter and west half of section 26, township 5 north, range 6 east, in this county, valued at \$14,700; the fractional north half of the southeast quarter of section 25, township 5 north, range 6 east, also in this county, valued at \$1,500; the west half of the southeast quarter and the southeast quarter of section 30, township 5 north, range 7 east, situated in Sacramento and San Joaquin counties, valued at \$6,000; the northeast quarter of section 26, township 5 north, range 6 east, and the south half of the southeast quarter of section 35, township 5 north, range 6 east, also located in Sacramento and San Joaquin counties, valued at \$6,150; the fractional southeast quarter of section 27, township 5 north, range 6 east, situated in this county, valued at \$1,500; the west half of block 38 in Galt, valued at \$250; a lot in Farris' addition to Galt, valued at \$400; lots 7 and 8 in Galt, valued at \$200; personal property valued at \$44 25. The total value of the estate is \$28,574 25.
