

CAPAY VALLEY, THE BEAUTIFUL.

A Remarkable Transformation in Five Years.

Residents of Woodland and Vicinity Make an Excursion to It Yesterday.

The excursion planned by W. R. Ellis of the Woodland Mail to the Capay Valley yesterday was a complete success.

The primary object was to show the inhabitants of Woodland and vicinity the magnificent resources of the valley, and the advantages to accrue to Woodland if its trade could be turned that way by a railroad built to connect Woodland and Madison.

The excursion planned by W. R. Ellis of the Woodland Mail to the Capay Valley yesterday was a complete success.

Five years ago the Capay Valley was occupied mainly by large ranches on which wheat and hay were grown.

Leaving Madison, the train proceeded about three miles to Esparto, the first of the new town sites.

At the time of the extension of the road it was simply a ranch; now it has about 100 inhabitants, with a high school, several stores and a lumber yard.

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EX-CONVICT JAS. MCCARTY IN JAIL.

Another One of the Murderous Gang Captured.

William Clegg Identifies Him as the Man Who Dropped the Stiletto.

Officers Logue and Taylor are confident they have under arrest at least one of the men who attempted to rob William Clegg on Sunday night in the northern part of the city, and who supplemented the attempt with an effort to kill him because he refused to yield to their demands.

When these officers on Monday arrested Tom Murphy, alias "New York Red," and John Hines they were certain they had secured two members of a band of desperadoes, several of whom had just been released from the State Prison, and they set about ascertaining more of the gang.

The two men were identified as the men who robbed Jacob Bloomberg's store the other morning of two watches.

Late on Monday night Logue and Taylor dropped into Googy Welch's dive on L street—better known as the old "Rosebud"—and there saw two men whom they suspected of being members of the gang that has been operating in the city.

The other fellow was safely landed in the police station. He proved to be one James McCarty, who was discharged from the State Prison about a year ago.
