

LATE SECRETARY GRESHAM.

Funeral Services to be Held at the White House To-Day.

THE BODY TO BE TAKEN TO CHICAGO FOR BURIAL.

Military and Naval Forces at the National Capital, Under Command of General Ruger, to Act as Escort to Funeral Party From the White House to the Depot—President Cleveland and All Members of the Cabinet to Follow the Remains to the Grave.

WASHINGTON, May 28.—Washington was hardly prepared for the announcement of the death of Secretary of State Gresham, which occurred at 10:30 a. m. this morning.

The President and Mrs. Cleveland called during the morning and were for half an hour with Mrs. Andrews, the daughter of the deceased man, and Mr. Gresham, the son-in-law of the President.

The funeral services in Washington will be of a semi-official character, and will be held in the east room of the White House, with the President and his cabinet, Justices of the Supreme Court, and representatives of the army and navy.

Major-General T. H. Ruger will command all of the military forces and will act as an escort for the funeral party from the White House to the depot, where a special train will be in readiness to convey the party to Chicago.

The seven cabinet officers, with Assistant Secretary Uhl, who is acting Secretary of the cabinet, will accompany the remains to Chicago, and it is expected he will be in the city in time from Tennessee, he will join the funeral party at the depot.

Secretary Gresham will be the third funeral service in the cabinet circle held in the White House in recent years.

AWFUL MARINE DISASTERS.

The Steamship Colima Wrecked Off the Coast of Mexico.

ONE HUNDRED AND SEVENTY-THREE LIVES LOST.

The French Steamship Dom Pedro Goes Down Off Cape Carrubedon on the West Coast of Galicia—Only Twenty-Nine of the Crew out of a Total of Forty-Nine Saved—All the Passengers, Eighty in Number, Either Killed by the Explosion of Her Boilers or Drowned.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 28.—A dispatch was received to-night by the Pacific Mail Steamship Company, from Manzanillo, Mexico, which read:

"Saved. Will wire particulars later." The Colima sailed for Panama and way ports on May 18th, and this is the first news that anything has happened to her.

The Pacific Mail officials here have received no information of disaster to the Colima, but can give no reason why such news should have been received.

Superintendent Schwerin's information is very meager. The message sent to him states that the ship was wrecked on May 27th, and a ship's boat containing five of the crew and fourteen passengers arrived at Manzanillo to-day, Tuesday.

Assistant Superintendent Avery of the Pacific Mail stated to an Associated Press reporter to-night that the Colima carried 192 people, and only nineteen were saved.

DEBS READY TO SERVE HIS SENTENCE.
