

THE EVENT WILL BE CELEBRATED.

A Salute of One Hundred Guns Will be Fired

When the First Electric Railway Car is Moved by Power Transmitted from Folsom.

It is expected by the Folsom Water Power Company that matters at the power-house in Folsom will be in shape before Saturday night for a test of the generating machinery there, and the transmission line and the transforming and distributing plant here.

There will be 4,000 horse-power in the plant, and the other two 1,000 horse-power machines are here and waiting for the masonry foundation to be finished and the necessary water connections to be made, which should be finished in time to send down the entire capacity of the plant by the first of August.

The managers of the company hope to have the test of the machine now in place so made that the street car system can be run with it by next Monday. It may be, however, that some further hitch may occur, as it is an experiment, being the longest transmission line in the world.

Although some are disposed to doubt the successful transmission of power to so great a distance, the General Electric Company, which has furnished plants throughout the United States, has undertaken to transmit the power at a loss of not over 20 per cent, and is likely to know pretty nearly what can be done. This company meets all the expense of the machinery at both ends, the transmission line and the labor of constructing and installing, which will amount to a total of \$300,000, and is to take the full amount in bonds of the Folsom Water Power Company, and it is hardly to be supposed that if the transmission of the power were impracticable the company would invest to that amount.

It has been decided by a number of prominent citizens that no notable event in scientific annals shall not go unnoticed, and they have therefore made arrangements that 100 guns shall be fired at Sutter's Fort at the time on which the first electric railway car is moved by the power from Folsom. The salute will be fired by Captain Cooke and a squad of his men.

Jacobs, Dolan and O'Hare to be Tried Therefor.

Torres' Skull Was Fractured, and He Was Also Fatally Injured in the Abdomen.

The cases of Oscar Jacobs, alias George Mollusk, Joseph Dolan and Daniel O'Hare, charged with having beaten Pastor Torres, a tamaia vendor, to death on Fourth street, between K and L, on the night of the 13th of last March, were called in Department Two of the Superior Court yesterday.
