Brilliant Appearance of the Exposition Building.

Some of the Attractive Displays to be Seen There—Events at the Park.

The opening of the Pavilion last night was not the occasion of a great outpouring of the populace, but the doors opened as per time card, and those who were present got not a little pleasure from the inspection of the various displays and from the excellent music provided by Roncovieri's Band.

Director Roncovieri and the audience were greatly disappointed by the fact that it was impossible to present the electric stereoscopic views in illustration of the music rendered, on account of the fact that the electric current was not ready for the apparatus. Mr. Roncovieri was in no wise to blame for the deficiency, and he has every assurance that every thing will be in readiness for to-night's concert.

An orchestra will be in attendance, both in the afternoon and evening, and refreshments will be served all who visit the headquarters during that time. Califa Parlor of the Native Daughters will assist the Native Sons in receiving. Argonaut Parlor of Oroville has applied for accommodations for forty members.

Yosemite Parlor of Merced announces that its members will bring a band with them. Miss Mariva Bertola, Grand President of the Native Daughters, and Mrs. Belle Douglass, Grand Trustee, have accepted the invitation sent to them to take part in the celebration.
