A GOOD IDEA. The Fratt Decoration Photographed—A Novel Method of Decorating.

The chief feature was three immense oil paintings, covering the entire length and width of the middle story. Above and below the balconies were tastefully draped festooned drapery of carnival colors and with American flags.
