

AN AFTERNOON'S RACING SPOILED.

One Heat Trotted in a Pelting Shower of Rain.

Then the Races Were Postponed—Very Large Attendance at the Race Track.

The sky was murky yesterday and somewhat threatening in the forenoon, but this did not prevent a very large crowd from attending the races. There were nearly one hundred vehicles in the paddock. The brisk shower of the preceding night had made the track soft near the pole, but by 1 o'clock it was in good condition, thanks to the efficient work done under the direction of Superintendent J. E. Terry.

THE STOCK PARADE.

The second grand stock parade, which had been postponed from the day before on account of the rain, was a very fine feature at Agricultural Park yesterday forenoon. The display began with the draft horses, of which some magnificent specimens were shown in the kingly Norman, Clyde, and Suffolk-Punch breeds.

While the display of swine, sheep, etc., is not so large this year as has been seen in previous years, yet there is a goodly representation of all the leading varieties, while on the score of quality the showing is fully up to the standard set at any of our fairs. Indeed, there are many who aver that the general average of excellence in the stock and swine exhibit is higher than ever before known, and it is certain that any competent judge of such matters would naturally become enthusiastic over the display.

The starters were Ruby M., Loupe, Prince Nutwood, Elia W. and Dickatus. Only one heat was paced, it being sanctioned between two of the second race. In the betting Dickatus brought \$20, Loupe \$1 and the field \$1. First heat—Elia W. would not come up in the scoring and got left, Dickatus broke on the first turn and he, too, was out of it. Prince Nutwood and Loupe way to the seven-eighths, with Loupe second, from three to four lengths, Ruby M. following by several lengths. In the last eighth, however, Loupe set out and he links and outpaced the Prince, winning by four lengths in 2:14, Ruby M. third. Summary—Purse \$1,000, for pacers, 2:19 class.

MAGGIE AND NETTIE.

Their Friends Try to Induce Kirch to Leave the City. When the case of Maggie Anderson and Nettie Williams, charged with having robbed a man named George H. Kirch of \$40, was called in the Police Court yesterday morning, it was announced that A. Anderson, their attorney, had withdrawn from the case.

H. L. Buckley, who was afterward retained by the women, asked for a continuance so that he could consult with the defendant.

His Pals Were Accused of Vagrancy and One Convicted. John Watson, alias Bailey, who recently came from Colquhoun, was held to answer in the Police Court yesterday for attempting to rob a man named W. F. Hill, at Third and K streets, Sunday night. His bail was fixed at \$2,000.

Hill was ordered detained as a witness against the defendant. Frank Nolan, alias Fred Smith, and Ed Haley, who are friends of Watson, and who were not far away from the latter when he was held, were also taken to jail to answer to the charge of being vagrants.

Officers D. Holland and J. Scanlon of Oakland testified that they were with Watson with the trio, and that their reputations, excepting that of Haley's, were not of the best.

CHIN HANE MUST HANG.

The Supreme Court Sustains the Superior Court's Sentence. The Supreme Court has decided that Chin Hane and Hoy Yeng Sing must suffer the punishment meted out to them by the Superior Court of this county for the murder of Lee Gong on Third street, between I and J, in this city, on May 31, 1892.

Chin Hane was sentenced to be hanged, and Sing was sentenced to life imprisonment in the State Prison at Folsom. The cases were appealed to the Supreme Court with the result stated.
