

COMMERCIAL.

An Advance in Flour of Twenty-Five Cents Per Barrel.

Wheat Lower, Both in the Speculative and Spot Markets—Barley Quiet and Steady.

San Francisco, February 4th. The anticipated advance in flour has come in the shape of an advance for all kinds of 25c per barrel.

The Potato and Onion markets are both rather weak; there are plenty of hands, and considerable more to arrive shortly.

There appears to be no improvement in the Fruit line, either as to price or the demand. Mexican Limes are firm, being rather scarce.

Butter and Cheese remain at previous prices. The Egg market seems to be in better shape than for the past week or two, and there is a disposition to check the rapid decline that has been going on.

There is no good reason why the market should be broken, as it has been. The trouble lies with the small dealers, who, when they receive a large order, offer them at a ridiculously low figure, thereby giving out the impression that the market is demoralized.
