Commissioner Manson of the Bureau of Highways Back Again. Commissioner Marsden Manson of the Bureau of Highways has returned from his trip through the northern counties of the State which he was unable to reach while on his first trip.

He found the northern part of Humboldt, Mendocino and Del Norte to be accessible only by roads up the coast, as there are no roads over the Coast Range north of the latitude of Ukiah and Colusa.

He is satisfied that one or more roads connecting the coast with the interior valley would very greatly aid in developing the country and add very largely to the prosperity of both coast and valley.

He gave an account of the primitive method of road repair that he saw in use on one of the tollroads. Five men were engaged in cutting manzanita brush and laying it in the ruts on the lower side of the road.

Del Norte County he found to be small and the finances sparse. The roads were most of them only recently trails, and of course are in a primitive state, the resources of the county being principally timber, dairy and mining.

He had intended going from Ukiah to Eureka by team, but found that it would be impossible for him to do so, and keep his other engagements, so he went back to San Francisco and went by steamer to Eureka.

Altogether, Mr. Manson is well pleased with the results of his trip.
