

NEW REPUBLICAN CLUB.

One Formed Last Night for the Twenty-First District.

A Call Issued to Form One for the Twentieth District To-morrow Night.

Nearly 200 persons were present last night at Pythian Castle at the meeting which had been called for the purpose of organizing a Twenty-first Assembly District Republican Club, the call having been issued by Dr. H. H. Look.

Much curiosity had been aroused as to the reason the call had been issued, as there were already two permanent clubs in existence, which were formed during the last campaign for the Twentieth and Twenty-first Districts, and which had large rolls of active members.

The officers of the Twentieth District Club are: C. H. Hubbard, President; Ed. Kay, Secretary, and A. G. Folger, Treasurer. Those of the Twenty-first District Club are: J. O. Coleman, President; J. L. Robinson, Vice-President; C. H. Holmes, Secretary, and Frank Miller, Treasurer.

There is already a club organized for that district, he said, as well as the Twentieth District. Dr. Look did not know this, he thought, at the time this call was made. The question for this meeting then is to decide whether it is or is not best to join the Twenty-first District Club and work with it in a strong organization.

Dr. Look said that he would prefer that some one of those who favored the new club should take charge of the meeting, as being organizer he did not wish to do so.

C. H. Holmes being called on to explain the status of the existing clubs, did so. He said that last September it was not deemed wise at the time of the campaign to elect new officers, and the election was therefore postponed.

Dr. Look suggested that Dr. Look be called to preside over the meeting, and put the motion already made. Dr. Look did so, and called for nominations for Secretary.

Mr. Soule was made the Permanent Secretary. J. R. Knowles was nominated for Vice-President and elected.

John Beaton and Daniel Hicks were nominated for Treasurer, but the latter declined, on the ground that, although he would always be with them in spirit, he should be absent during part of the campaign, and Beaton was elected.

Mr. Sullivan moved that the Chair appoint a committee of five as a standing Membership Committee. Carried. A committee of five on By-Laws and Resolutions was also ordered appointed.

BROWN WAS INDIGNANT.

He Throws Out Some Dark and Mysterious Hints.

City Attorney Brown was in the war-path yesterday morning in reference to an article published in the evening paper the day before in relation to the complaint in the case of Mamie Brown, charged with petit larceny, and charging that the reporter had been denied a sight of the complaint when he wished to ascertain the true name of the complaining witness.

Mamie appeared for sentence this morning and H. L. Buckley, her attorney, made a strong plea for a fine instead of imprisonment, stating that she had never been charged with such an offense before. She had been brought before him while Police Judge on complaint of her mother, on account of her waywardness and had gone from bad to worse, until she found herself in the present situation. If not sentenced to jail, however, she would stay with her mother and reform.

City Attorney Brown said that the case was one that was very close to the line between grand and petit larceny. A number of such cases had been sent to the Superior Court, but after putting the country to the expense of a trial a conviction had not been secured. He had thought it better, therefore, in this case to allow her to plead guilty to petit larceny and assure a conviction.

He alluded to the article in question and said that a due regard for decency had in the past influenced him in some cases of a similar character, but this was the last time he should show any regard for any person so lost to the sense of decency as to try to thus injure one who had not committed any crime or been accused of one. If it were not for respect to the families and relatives of those who have criticized this man, he could far more strongly criticize them than they could the complainant, and he could bring proofs and circumstances that would make it look far worse for them, for he is not a married man. The "Record-Union" had published the name as given to the reporter by the officials, it being the man's first and middle names, but not his last name.

The reporter of the evening paper, he declared, had misunderstood what he was told. Everyone knows that public documents are open to inspection, except in such cases as the court has ordered differently, and the reporter could have obtained from him the name he sought, if he pursued a proper method of procedure.

The court said that he knew nothing of the facts of the case except what had appeared before him. The girl had pleaded guilty of petit larceny, and he was no cause for criticism in any way. It was a case very near to the line of a penitentiary offense, but he thought it was probably better to allow her to plead guilty of petit larceny than to take the chances of her being acquitted in the Superior Court. While men who visit such women are entitled to protection from such robbery, it was her offense and he thought a degree of leniency shown might effect a reformation in her. At the same time her act showed a depraved nature and he should sentence her to four months in the County Jail.

Gregovitch, a very wealthy man, who during the war with Turkey was Controller for the Prince of Montenegro. It appears that his son, Matew Gregovitch, is employed in a restaurant in this city, and on Monday received a letter from his brothers in Constantinople announcing his father's death and that he had been left his full share of his fortune. The letter stated that the writer had received dispatches of condolence from seventy crown heads and nobles of the various countries of Europe. Young Gregovitch is making preparations to return to his native land.

LENTEN SEASON. It Begins With To-day, Which is Ash Wednesday.

The season of Lent, which is observed by the Episcopal and Catholic Churches, begins to-day, Ash Wednesday. Yesterday was Shrove Tuesday. At St. Paul's Church services will be held to-day at 10 a. m. and 7:30 p. m., and throughout Lent there will be services daily, the hours being announced from day to day from the chancel. Lectures will be delivered at each service, and persons of all religious beliefs will be cordially welcomed.

Services will be held at the Cathedral at the usual hours each day, and on the occasions of important holidays will have special features.

RESULTED FATALY. Captain Fred Eisenminger Dies After a Long Illness.

After a long and tedious illness Fred Eisenminger passed away yesterday. Deceased was born in this city 44 years ago in the International Hotel, then conducted by his parents. He was the last of the family, his father, mother and brother having died several years ago. For many years past Mr. Eisenminger had been an employe of the Western Hotel. At one time he was a very active spirit in local military circles, and was commander of the cadet company that once flourished here. He acquired quite a reputation as drillmaster.

WANTED IN THE EAST. Arrest of H. B. Cooper on a Warrant From Iowa.

Sheriff W. C. Conroy of Placer County came to the city yesterday in search of a man named H. B. Cooper, alias Chas. Brown, who is wanted in Henry County, Ia., on a charge of seduction. Cooper had been located at Oak Park, near this city, and Sheriff Johnson accompanied Conroy there, where they arrested Cooper. He was taken by Sheriff Conroy to Auburn, where he will be held until an officer comes for him.

Sentence Commuted. Governor Budd has commuted the sentence of Thomas Upson, sentenced in January, 1896, to six months' imprisonment in the County Jail and to pay a fine of \$300, to expire February 18th upon payment of the fine.

Upson is a young man and has always borne a good character and does not belong to the criminal class. He promises to leave San Francisco and devote himself to legitimate business, and as none of the officers of the court object, the Governor thinks forty days' imprisonment and the fine a sufficient punishment.

A Deserted Wife. L. H. Slater was yesterday granted by Judge Johnson a divorce from Lena V. Slater on the ground of desertion. The parties reside at Oak Park, and had been married but a few weeks when Mrs. Slater refused to live longer with her husband.
