

ON THE BRINY DEEP.

Absoonding Secretary Mallory Has Been Finally Located.

He is on His Way to Japan, and Will be Arrested There as Soon as He Lands.

There is little doubt that Frank J. Mallory, the absconding Assistant Secretary of the Sutter Club, will soon be under arrest.

He is on the last steamer that left for Japan, and when he sets foot in Yokohama he will walk into the open arms of a Japanese policeman.

It was learned in San Francisco yesterday morning at the office of the Occidental and Oriental Steamship Company that Mallory was on the way to the Orient on the steamer Doric.

Passenger Agent Avery positively identified a photograph of Mallory as that of a man who rushed into the office last Thursday just before the steamer departed and secured a ticket under the name of James Anderson.

Captain Harry Morse, who has been tracing Mallory, upon obtaining this information, at once telegraphed the fact to this city, and the Grand Jury took the matter up at once and it is believed indicted the embezzler so that the proper papers for his arrest would be obtained in time to permit one of Morse's men to leave for Japan on the next steamer.

Meanwhile a cablegram has been sent to Japan to have the Assistant Secretary detained on his arrival there.

LOWER COURT SUSTAINED.

The Supreme Court's Decision in a Water Rights Case.

The Supreme Court has rendered a decision in the case of the People's Ditch Company, respondent, vs. The 76 Land and Water Company and the Alta Irrigation Company, appellants.

It was a Tulare County case, and an appeal from the judgment and order denying a new trial in an action by the respondent, as a prior appropriator, to enjoin the defendants from diverting water from King's River so as to interfere with respondent's appropriation, judgment being in favor of respondent, enjoining such diversion.

The court holds the demurrer of the Alta Irrigation Company to be joined as defendant in the amended complaint to have been rightly overruled, as the company had, subsequently to the joining of issue on the original complaint, taken a conveyance from The 76 Land and Water Company of all its rights to divert the waters of King's River, together with its canals and ditches, under which conveyance the vendee claimed the right to make a diversion of the waters.

It was therefore clearly a necessary party to the determination of the controversy and was properly included.

The other contentions made by the appellants are not sustained and the judgment and order are affirmed.

IN THE FIRST DEGREE.

Charles White Was Yesterday Convicted of Burglary.

In Judge Hinkson's court yesterday Charles White, a young man, whose complexion is in striking contrast with his name, was convicted of burglary in the first degree, and will receive sentence to-morrow.

He was arrested some weeks ago by Officer Maley for breaking into a Japanese barber shop in the alley between Third and Fourth, L and M streets, and stealing therefrom several razors and other articles.

BUREAU OF HIGHWAYS.

Some Important Bulletins Will Soon be Issued by It.

The Bureau of Highways held an important meeting yesterday, all the members being present.

Some time ago the Capital City Wheelmen requested the bureau to hold a meeting of conference with them for the consideration of road matters. At the meeting yesterday the Secretary was instructed to communicate with the wheelmen and ask them to set a date some time within a month for such a meeting.

TAKEN TO THE WOODS.

Convict Charles Wilson Makes His Escape From Folsom.

A convict named Charles Wilson, who was serving a term for burglary committed in San Francisco, escaped from the Folsom Prison on Wednesday morning and is still at large. The last heard from him was that he had managed to cross the American River and get into the thick chaparral on the north side, and thus elude the guards who are hunting for him.

Wilson was employed as a waiter in the guards' dining-room. There was a guard at the front door and another at the rear, but the former, Charles Coyle, got tired waiting for his breakfast and went inside to eat. He told Wilson to bring him some coffee, and the prisoner pretended to go for it, but instead slipped out. It was about 4 o'clock in the morning, and Wilson succeeded in reaching the river.

A colored man named Newton Fisher was convicted in the Police Court yesterday to forty days in the County Jail. Thomas Bleet, another colored individual, pleaded guilty of vagrancy and was sentenced to seventy days in the County Jail.
