

COMMERCIAL.

Little Doing in Spot Wheat, and Rates Not Well Maintained.

Some Inquiry for Hops, But It is Mostly Speculative and at Low Figures.

San Francisco, March 15th. There were no features of the local wheat market yesterday worthy of note. In the Call Board there was quite an active attempt to advance prices at the informal session, but despite the liberal buying of the bull element the advance was too weak to sustain the movement, and the downward movement commenced at once and was continued through the regular morning session. At the close May was 1/2c better than the final figures on Friday, while December was exactly the same. In Spot Wheat very little is doing at present, and the quoted rates are not very well sustained. The English markets are quiet, and the increased demand for cargo lots has caused a weakness in values which has an influence on the local situation that is not particularly encouraging to the selling interest.

Beans are selling slowly, and mostly in small lots. There has been some inquiry for Limas for export, but the movement in other varieties has been very dull. There has been no evidence of heavy supplies in any variety, particularly of desirable qualities, but offerings generally are larger than the requirements.
