

COMMERCIAL.

Little Doing in Spot Wheat, and Rates Not Well Maintained.

Some Inquiry for Hops, But It is Mostly Speculative and at Low Figures.

San Francisco, March 15th. There were no features of the local wheat market yesterday worthy of note. In the Call Board there was quite an active attempt to advance prices at the informal session, but despite the liberal buying of the bull element the situation was too weak to sustain the advance, and the downward movement commenced at once and was continued through the regular morning session. At the close May was 4c better than the final figures on Friday, while December was exactly the same. In Spot Wheat very little is doing at present, and the quoted rates are not very well sustained. The English markets are quiet, and the increased demand for cargo lots has caused a weakness in values which has an influence on the local situation that is not particularly encouraging to the selling interest.

Beans are selling slowly, and mostly in small lots. There has been some inquiry for Limas for export, but the movement in other varieties has been very dull. There has been no evidence of heavy supplies in any variety of desirable qualities, but offerings generally are larger than requirements.

There is some inquiry for Hops, but it is mostly speculative, and at low figures. Supplies of Oranges are moderate and well proportioned to the demand. Choices and Navels are very firmly held, and prices on both Navels and Seedlings have been advanced a trifle. Apples of good quality are scarce, and the quoted rates are steady.

Asparagus and Peas are more plentiful, and meet with a more extensive sale. Dried Fruits are inactive, and the quoted prices, while largely nominal, are, nevertheless, a shade stiffer than two weeks ago. Creamery Butter is arriving freely, and is held fairly well. Other varieties of Butter are very slow to sell. Eggs are abundant, and low prices still prevail. Cheese is steady. Poultry is dull, but not quotably lower.

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
