Treated leniently for his shooting at Maud Methven.

It was possible, however, that a jury would not have convicted him on the charge.

John Berry, the young man who a couple of months ago shot at a young girl named Maud Methven at her home on Eighth street, was in Judge Hinkson's court yesterday for trial on a charge of assault to murder.

District Attorney Ryan, addressing the court, said he had consented to allow the defendant to withdraw his plea of not guilty and enter one of guilty to simple assault. He then stated to the court the facts in the case.

Young Berry had become somewhat enamored of Miss Methven, though not personally acquainted with her. He was a youth of rather weak mind, and was given to over-indulgence in liquor.

The defense, said Mr. Ryan, would be temporary insanity, and from his investigation of the defendant's character and conduct he believed it would be impossible to convince a jury, beyond a reasonable doubt, that Berry was responsible for his act at the time of the shooting.
