

DECREE TO MRS. AUZERAIS.

Judge Sanderson Sets Her Free Because of Her Husband's Neglect.

The Latter Has Been Left to Pursue His Art Studies and the Wife Her Theatricals.

Last evening's San Francisco "Bulletin" states that Mrs. Lucy W. Auzeais was granted her decree of divorce yesterday in that city.

The history of this eccentric couple has been published time and time again. Auzeais is a young man of good old French family, resident at San Jose, and his wife was a Sacramento girl.

Auzeais was in the paint and oil business before he took to studying sculpture, and does not appear to have at any time been the possessor of much of the world's goods.

There are several extraordinary stories told of Mrs. Auzeais and her eccentric ways. One is that she and her husband rented Crittenden Thornton's residence during Mrs. Thornton's absence in Europe.

Then came the time when Mrs. Auzeais found her fortunes sadly crippled by these wild ventures. All this while Auzeais had been quietly pursuing his studies of sculpture and not contributing very much to the menage.

The result was the filing of a suit for divorce last month. The testimony given before Commissioner Pinkham was that Auzeais had contributed nothing toward his wife's support for four and a half years.

The banks of the city have under consideration the matter of purchasing some of the bonds, and it is said there is a fair prospect of sufficient local capital being invested to insure the success of the enterprise.

Embezzlement of public funds included in treaty, but not embezzlement of money of private individuals or institutions."

Petition in Insolvency.

J. P. Dalton and Thomas Halloran, saloon-keepers, have filed a petition in insolvency. Their liabilities amount to \$593.40. The moneys due from patrons for drinks amount to \$23.25, and one loan of \$86.65 was made. The total assets not exempt from execution amount to \$109.85.

In Judge Hinkson's court yesterday John Robinson pleaded guilty to petty larceny in having taken a harness from D. K. Lindsay's barn. The original charge was burglary, but as there was a doubt about substantiation that charge it was allowed to be reduced.

Judge Catlin yesterday granted Frederick B. Brown a divorce from Lullie Brown, on the ground of desertion. S. Luke Howe was the plaintiff's attorney, but no defense was made.
