

PHOTOGRAPHERS' LICENSES.

Does the Proposed Ordinance Affect the Amateurs?

If It Does, the Disciples of the Kodak Will Make Music for the Public.

Concerning the row among the professional photographers over the proposed ordinance laying on a license of \$50 a quarter for doing business it has been stated that the Sacramento Camera Club is "stirred up" and has made expression on the subject.

It is added that the club is on the best of terms with all the regular photographers who have no quarrels with them and will have none. That its desire is to maintain the most friendly relations with the professionals, who have always treated them well and often accommodated them.

It seems that some time ago a member of the California Camera Club of San Francisco visited Sacramento, and asked the courtesy of using the rooms of the Sacramento club. It was granted, of course. Shortly after an officer found her developing a lot of negatives of groups of school children she had taken at the public schools, evidently for the purpose of selling the pictures to the children. She was informed at once that it could not be permitted and she ceased her work.

It is known now that pictures of school groups have been peddled about, much to the indignation of some parents. The officers of the Camera Club agree with them. It is probably out of this circumstance that the complaint of the professionals has in part, at least, arisen.

The Sacramento club, however, will express itself to-night, if at all, but its leading members say it is no row of theirs, and they distinctly disclaim taking sides with either of two factions among the professionals.

No license law can be or will be passed to affect the Camera Club, and any attempt in that direction will be a dismal failure. However, it is understood that the professionals do not aim at the club, but at certain itinerant wanderers who hawk their wares and who are within the meaning of Judge Hinkson's late decision, "peddlers and hawkers," from whom a license tax may be exacted.

But if the ordinance is to be construed, as is claimed it will or may be, that no amateur photographer shall sell any of his work, it is an outrage and an absurdity. Under such a law if one saw in the collection of an amateur photographer a picture of which he desired a copy, he could not receive it from the amateur except as a present. When an amateur hawks pictures or peddles them from door to door, he becomes a professional and ceases to be an amateur.
