LITTLE DOING IN WHEAT—EASTERN MARKETS LOWER.

Choice Feed Barley Firm, With Very Little Offering—Trading in Oats Light.

San Francisco, April 28th. Wheat shows no change, although Eastern markets are lower; there is little doing. Choice Feed Barley is firm, with very little offering.

Receipts were 534 boxes of Asparagus, 1,100 sacks of Peas, 522 boxes of Rhubarb, 678 sacks of New Potatoes. Peas were way down and sold by the sack.

Receipts of Strawberries were 500 chests and of Cherries 237 boxes, and both are weaker. Gooseberries sold for 50c per drawer.

Butter and Cheese are unchanged. Eggs are in slow demand and prices are lower; the Eastern here and to arrive have weakened the California article.

The Eastern Poultry on the market is selling at \$6.50 for Hens, 15c for Turkeys, \$6.50 for Old Roosters and \$9 for Young, \$5 for Ducks, Roosters and Young Ducks are lower; Turkeys are scarce and higher.
