Mr. Herrick, the pastor, he offered his congratulations to him and his co-workers for their success in developing the Baptist interest in that vicinity, telling him also that it was a privilege to be called as its pastor.

Rev. Mr. Banks followed by giving a few words of encouragement to the people of the church and community, for it would be like a new garden blossoming and growing in that beautiful locality. He said they must take care of it, and emerged upon the thought that they had been privileged to have such an organization, a part of the large body of Baptists in this county. He hoped they would follow the instructions of the Master and turn a deaf ear to objections raised by the world. They certainly would if they followed the teachings of their pastor.

Rev. Mr. Reed extended the right hand of fellowship and welcome of the denomination to Rev. Mr. Herrick and through him as pastor.
