each in a year. They begin to lay early if they have been well kept through the winter, and the eggs are large and pure white in color.

It is best to use hens or an incubator to hatch ducks; and they may be raised "by hand" very easily, if they have a warm place to sleep. A young duck is mostly appetite, and is not particular as to what is given him to eat, just so it is wet and soft, and they will live and thrive on food that would starve a chick. We feed corn meal, wheat middlings, scrap meat and cracked corn, feeding all of it pretty wet, as a duck likes to have his food wet when eaten. A flock of young ducks will eat an astonishing amount of freshly cut grass, if it is chopped into short lengths, and purslane, lettuce, beet-tops and other green stuff of that sort is greedily devoured. If well fed, a Pekin duck will attain to a weight of five pounds in ten weeks, and at that age they are in demand as roasters for the city trade.

It is not necessary to have water for ducks to run in all the time, but they must have plenty of it to drink, and this should be changed often, as they get into it, and it soon gets filled with filth, unless there is a new supply furnished. There is not a bit of danger of over-feeding a lot of young ducks, as they will eat until their crops hang to the ground, and feel comfortable. The usual thing about a young duck is the ease with which it can be drowned by a heavy rain. Until their feathers get started, a hard rain will drown them as soon as it will a chicken. When caught out in a rain, they will stand with their heads up and mouths open and soon give up the ghost. After their feathers start there is no danger from anything of this kind.

A flock of laying ducks should have one drake to about five ducks, and should be fed corn and cracked wheat, and kept shut up in the morning until they have laid their eggs, or they will wander off and drop them anywhere about the place. Have a dry house for them to keep in, and have it well bedded with straw, which is frequently renewed.

DEMAND FOR "CLEAN MILK."

There is often much complaint in the cities and smaller towns, where milk is delivered by dairymen, against the quality of the milk. In most of the cities there is an authorized inspector to see that the milk sold has a certain standard of butter fat or cream, and anything below the standard is prohibited. The deficiency sometimes found in this respect is not always the fault of the "milkman." He is frequently dependent upon the farmers to furnish his supply for his customers, and they sometimes have all grades of cows, and often such are noted for the quantity rather than the quality of the milk they yield. The innocent milkman is sometimes imposed upon by this thin milk, even when he waters it.

There is a quality of milk of greater importance to the consumer than the butter fat, and which is not so easily detected by the Babcock test, and the want of which sometimes renders the milk unfit for use. We refer to its purity; this indispensable property depends upon the condition of the cows from which the milk is taken, which again depends upon the manner of their keeping, feeding and milking. To protect honorable and cleanly dairymen in their business, there should be a milk and dairy inspector in every city, whose duty it should be, among other things, to visit the dairy establishments of all the dairymen who supply milk to the city.

These officers should be authorized to enforce cleanliness for the stables in which the cows are kept, for a proper arrangement, as well as cleanliness for the cows, and finally cleanliness for the milk.

THE POULTRY YARD.

Now, while this nice weather lasts, give the hen-house a cleaning; do it thoroughly, for lice will soon start their annual (or shall I say weekly?) brood.

When you have cleaned the house and nest, and raked all droppings and the gravel, dust the whole place with air-slacked lime (if you can not whitewash it); then get your brush and can of petroleum oil, and give the roosts a good coat all over. Oil the places where the roosts rest at ends; a little in the nest-boxes will help, and some about the edges of the drop platform over roosts, or any such places where lice can get.

I find petroleum better than kerosene; it goes further, is cheaper, and, best of all, it does not evaporate so quickly; and when fumes warm up the roosts at night the fumes of the oil go all through the fowls and help drive off any lice. I believe the roosts when kept well oiled with petroleum are as good as lice exterminators as one can have in a poultry house.

Next month you will wish to set a few hens. Therefore, look well to the little things that will insure fertile eggs from healthy stock.

Have for the hens a good supply of broken bones, shells, gravel and some sort of green food. Lacking this help, the sweepings of the hayrow will help, and a few green weeds will do.

It will cause some trouble, but be sure your hens are all clean on the legs (feet of scab). If at all rough, oil them well with petroleum, and in a few days they will be bright and smooth; but, perhaps a few may need a second oiling.

You ask, why this work? The scab is a disease which will go through the flock and on down to the chicks as soon as hatched, and only healthy fowls can do their best.

Sort out all hens that are not active and perfectly healthy—twenty good hens are worth forty fair ones. Now, see to the cocks. Are they vigorous and sturdy, broad-breasted, and the right color to mate your hens to insure a healthy, hearty lot of chicks? Remember, the cock is half the flock, and an extra dollar spent on him in getting a good one may mean 100 per cent. profit next fall.

No need of fancy nests, houses or fowls, but do your best with what you have; keep things clean, keep down lice and keep the fowls perfectly fed, and they will keep you in eggs and give you sure there is money in hens, even the common kinds.

It is the little things done at the right time that mean success, or if left undone will be a great hindrance and cause loss all through the season.—Country Gentleman.
