

CITY BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Bids Received for Wood and Stationery Supplies.

Plans Submitted for Additions to be Built to Several School Buildings.

The City Board of Education met last night, Directors Davis, Sherrill, Crouch, Brown, Driver, Dolan, Buchanan and Perkins being present, and Director Davis presiding.

It being the time for opening bids, the board took up that business first. Those for wood were for white oak mountain wood and pine. John Skelton bid \$5 49 for each; W. K. Cothern, \$5 50 for oak and \$6 25 for pine; Charles Studard bid \$5 64 for oak, and \$6 20 for second growth; H. Nottingham, white oak, \$5 55; black oak, 5 90; M. Hanrahan, white oak, \$5 73, pine, \$5 65.

They were referred to the Committee on Furniture and Supplies. The bids for stationery were read, and the bidders were W. F. Purnell and H. S. Crocker & Co. They were referred to the Committee on Furniture and Supplies.

George Mott presented a petition from property-holders adjacent to the Sacramento Grammar School grounds, claiming that the outbuildings were unsightly, a menace to health and a rendezvous for loafers and dissolute persons at night, and asking that they be removed, as a nuisance.

Mr. Mott stated that a number of young men congregate there at night and render the small hours hideous with their vocal attempts. He made a very strong argument in favor of removing the buildings, or at least inclosing them so that they can be only used by the school.

Director Crouch said that the matter had been brought before the board before, and it should be attended to and some action taken. The citizens are entitled to consideration of their wishes.

Director Buchanan also spoke to the same effect, as did Director Brown. Some discussion followed and the matter was referred to the Committee on Buildings and Repairs.

Superintendent Erlwine suggested that two are lights be placed in the grounds near the building, which would obviate much of the nuisance.

Mr. Lawrence of the electric company, was called on to give an estimate of the expense. He said he thought that the lamps would be as good as police and would drive away the evildoer. Lamps could be placed in the grounds that can be kept burning every night at a cost of \$10 per month each and with the benefit of any uniform reduction in rates.

Superintendent Erlwine thought one should be placed at the night school. Mr. Mott thought that the lights would do much to abate the nuisance complained of and he favored them, but was opposed to the inclosure of the old buildings, and hoped that an estimate for new buildings would be included in the board's next estimate of the expenses for the ensuing year.

The board signified its intention to do so. The Committee on Furniture and Supplies asked further time to report on the offer of a local firm to furnish filters for the school buildings, which was granted.

The board proceeded to the consideration of the plans offered by the various architects for the additions to the school buildings. Messrs. Cook, Scharden, Seadler, Ough and Mayo explained the plans for the additions, and the board discussed them at some length.

President Davis read a letter from the Mayor stating that the carpenter employed by the board resided at Oak Park and that complaint had been made to him that such employment came under the provision of the charter that none of the city's employes should live outside the city.

Mr. Davis said that he had replied that as the carpenter was paid out of the school fund, which was State and county money, he thought his employment came under the State law.

Action on the matter was deferred until the return of Director Whitbeck. It was announced that H. W. Johnson would deliver an address at the Sacramento Grammar School for the Fourth of July exercises on July 3d, E. C. Hart at the Sutter Grammar School and Ar-

thur E. Miller at the Harkness Grammar School.

The Committee on Buildings and Repairs was instructed to have the weeds cut on the streets in front of the school buildings.

The engraving of the diplomas was awarded to Miss Mary Hinkson. Miss Ida Fleming, having served successfully as a substitute for six months, was elected into the department as a teacher.

Misses Mollie Morton, Jessie Donaldson and Jennie Proran made application for positions as teachers.

In view of the fact that the weather is hot and the walking bad, the Chairman of the Finance Committee is directed to write Mr. Whitbeck inclosing a stamp for reply delicately asking him if he will be able to borrow enough coin to pay his way home, and if it appear he is stranded, that we assess ourselves enough to pay his way back. That the incident may be made of general profit, Mr. Whitbeck will on his return deliver an address at the High School describing the physical and mental feelings of a man while holding up his hands to heaven and regarding a Winchester as of equal caliber with a Krupp cannon.

The board then adjourned to meet next Monday night.
