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WATERMELONS. Wheelmen Expected to Dispose of Six Thousand of Them.

Reference was recently made to the fact that on August 9th the Terminal City Wheelmen of Stockton will hold a watermelon function near that city and had invited the wheelmen of this city to participate.

The Secretary of the Terminal City Wheelmen is now daily in receipt of letters from other bicycle clubs announcing the intention of the corresponding club to join with the Stockton club in the celebration of the first annual watermelon run to be held on Sunday, August 9th.

The club propose to make it the biggest bicycle meet in the State, and in its having much encouragement in its efforts. A contract has been entered into for furnishing 6,000 melons on that day for the wheelmen, and to be used up in the watermelon battle, which is to be a feature of the day's sport. One of the features of the parade will be a mounted band.
