J. Oschner, against whom two charges of peace disturbing had been made by Herman Schoertz, pleaded guilty and was fined \$5.

A complaint had been lodged against John Sullivan, Harry Seitz, Frank Lemke and Lazarus Bloomberg for having disturbed the peace of the watchman at the Pavilion.

B. H. Covell, Jr., was arraigned on a charge of embezzlement preferred by J. R. Cattlet, and the preliminary examination set for Tuesday next.

The preliminary examination of G. Ellory, charged with having obtained money under false pretenses, was continued until this morning.
