

THE CLASS DAY EXERCISES.

Graduating Pupils of the High School Give Them.

A Unique and Interesting Entertainment, and a Hop in the Assembly Chamber.

The class day exercises of the class of '96 of the High School were held in the Assembly Chamber at the Capitol yesterday and were at once unique, interesting and provocative of mirth. They were conceived and carried out by the members of the class and showed that the class is mentally one of the strongest ever graduated from the school.

The chamber, both on the floor and in the gallery, was well filled with the invited guests, who thoroughly enjoyed the entertainment provided for them and frequently testified their appreciation.

At the proper time Wielder of the Olive Branch W. B. Dunlap entered the chamber and took his seat in the Speaker's chair and gave the signal for the entrance of the class of '96. The orchestra struck up a lively strain and the class entered, clothed in white, wearing the class badge, a gold-colored ribbon, and singing the class song.

The Wielder delivered a brief address, in which the vocabulary of both Webster and the Standard Dictionary seemed to have been exhausted and several encyclopedias deeply dipped into. It contained several humorous allusions that were hailed with delight by the pupils.

Miss Maud L. Merkley, the Condenser and Recorder of Incidents, was called on to read the minutes of the last meeting, which was replete with humor.

E. Birdsall, for the Committee on Credentials, presented its report, which was not behind the other features in fun. It recommended several members of the middle class for initiation into the mysterious Order of Chuckleheads.

The report was accepted and at a given signal from the Wielder of the Olive Branch the class fed away to give entrance to the neophytes, who were escorted into his presence with due ceremony by Assistant Wielder of the Olive Branch Charles Ruth, and there initiated with awful pomp and an unequalled ritual, which put to blush that of the Knights of Malta and similar organizations.
