

THE PEOPLE'S PARTY NATIONAL CONVENTION

Nominates William J. Bryan for President of the United States.

Notwithstanding His Telegram Declining the Honor.

Received Ten Hundred and Forty-Two Votes, Against Three Hundred and Twenty-One Cast for Colonel Norton of Chicago, the Candidate of the Unreconstructed "Middle of the Road" Delegates.

ST. LOUIS, July 25.—The National Convention of the People's Party, after four days of heat, turmoil and unlimited oratory, completed its labors at 4:40 o'clock this afternoon, and adjourned sine die. Notwithstanding the receipt of one or more telegrams from W. J. Bryan declining to permit the use of his name on the Populist ticket unless Arthur Sewall, his associate on the Chicago ticket, was also endorsed, Mr. Bryan was put in for Presidential nomination, as originally contemplated by General Weaver of Ohio, and was seconded by one or more spokesmen from every State and Territory, with about ten exceptions, and on a ballot received 1,042 votes, against 321 for Colonel Norton of Chicago, who at the last moment was selected as the candidate of the unreconstructed "middle of the road" element.

It was the intention of this faction early in the morning to place Eugene Debs in nomination, and thus to force the labor issue to the front, but Mr. Debs telegraphed declining to serve, and his telegram was respected.

Strenuous efforts were made, without avail, by Ignatius Donnelly and others to obtain some kind of an assurance that Mr. Bryan would accept the nomination and stand upon the platform. The permanent chairman, Senator Allen of Nebraska, admitted that he had received some kind of a telegram from Mr. Bryan, but he said he had paid no attention to it. He also said he had received one supposed to be from Governor Stone, but would not open it until he reached his home in Nebraska.

Before adjourning the convention adopted a resolution clothing the National Committee with plenary powers to do anything and everything which the convention itself might have done if in session. This, of course, would authorize it to take down the names of either Mr. Bryan or Mr. Watson, or both, if necessary, and to construct an entirely new ticket. The National Committee was enlarged so as to consist of three members from each State and Territory. But naturally the power conferred upon this cumbersome body will eventually be lodged in an Executive Committee of more manageable size.

A noticeable feature of the last moments of the convention was the fact that although the result of the ballot for President was announced it was not followed up by any declaration on the part of the Chair that Mr. Bryan had been duly chosen the candidate of the People's party for President of the United States.

The convention separated in bad humor, many of the delegates openly denouncing the ticket as a "theatrical" one. It, however, met the unequal approval of Mrs. Lease of Kansas (whose name, usually printed as "Mary Ellen," was officially stated to be "Mary Elizabeth"). In an impassioned address, she assured the delegates that they had risen to the grandeur of the occasion, and had done honor to the party and to themselves.

CONVENTION PROCEEDINGS.

Bryan Nominated for President by the Populists.

ST. LOUIS, July 25.—The convention was called to order at 9:40 o'clock. After prayer by the Rev. Mr. Kent of Washington, the Chairman repeated his ruling of last night that the amendment adopted by the convention giving the nomination of Vice-President preference over the nomination of President made the selection of National Committee men the next order of business. J. K. Burkett of California protested that this was not so, and contended that the convention simply transposed the nomination of Vice-President and President. The Chairman replied that the gentleman's statement of the fact was entirely mistaken, and went on with the naming of National Committee men. When this was completed he called next for Committee on Notification.

The Chair announced that the next order of business was nominations for President.

Green of Nebraska got on the platform to make a motion and a speech. The latter was to the effect that this was one of the important conventions that ever assembled on American soil, as it was to name a man who was not only to head the ticket, but who was to be elected. At this point the speech was interrupted by points of order, which irritated Mr. Green to the extent of making him leave the stand. He was, however, induced to come back, and the rules were suspended to enable him to go on in order. He declared, however, that his self-respect would prevent him from saying anything, and he retired for good.

Alabama being called, George Gaither of that State addressed the convention and yielded to General Weaver. General Weaver opened his speech with the remark that the condition of the People's party this morning was most

"critical." He had but two aspirations—one was to preserve unimpaired and unbroken the great principles of the party, and the other was to preserve the party organization for future use. He assumed that all delegates had read in the papers this morning the telegram from Mr. Bryan declining to accept the nomination of the People's party dissociated from Mr. Sewall. "No man," said Mr. Weaver, "could have done less and be a man. Mr. Bryan's attitude challenges the respect of every delegate present, and of every man who reads the proceedings of this convention. "But," he continued, "this is a greater question than the personality of our candidate. After I read Mr. Bryan's telegram I utterly refused—and I now utterly refuse—to concur with the declaration of Mr. Bryan or Senator Jones as to who shall be the candidates of this convention."

Bryan's name was received with applause, the whole convention standing on chairs and waving hats. A gigantic cross, surmounted by a golden globe, with the name of Bryan's famous epigram, was brought in and carried around the hall. The guilds of States were raised, and a vociferous attempt was made to raise enthusiasm, but with a marked absence of spontaneity. A portion of Bryan was played, and numerous devices were carried around the hall. All the States joined in the demonstration except Missouri, Texas, Rhode Island and Wisconsin.

After the hippodrome performance had lasted nearly twenty minutes the convention was called to order. The General Field of Virginia came to the front and in a short impassioned speech declared Mr. Bryan the choice of the Virginia delegation, and declared that although no music had been provided, the convention was marching to the "music of the speeches."

"Now, gentlemen of the jury," he went on, "I mean gentlemen of the convention, I move that the rules be suspended and that W. J. Bryan be unanimously nominated."

The Chairman put the question, and two-thirds of the audience responded with vigorous shouts of "aye." This cry, however, was accompanied by the counter cries of "no," "call the roll of States." Several of the most excited opponents got on the platform and angrily prevented the Chairman from declaring the result of the vote. During the uproar Ashley of Texas stepped to the front and obtained a hearing. He said that the State of Texas had already polled 165,000 Populist votes and he wanted to know of what other State that fact could be asserted. Texas was ready to endorse Mr. Bryan if Bryan would endorse him without that would be the act of children. (Cheers.)

Mr. Howard protested that the motion for suspension of the rules was out of order. Such a rule had heretofore been unknown in Populist conventions. The roll call also extended Bryan's nomination as did Indian Territory. Iowa yielded to Kolb of Alabama, who (vacating the Chair) addressed the convention in a speech seconding the nomination of Bryan, whom he eulogized as a peerless statesman, as one who would, if elected, see that the free and unlimited coinage of silver was established, and the golden god of Wall street dethroned.

When Kansas was called Jerry Simpson made a short speech seconding the nomination of Bryan, and eulogizing him. The delegates from Louisiana put forward as their orator a handsome brown-haired young woman, Mrs. Roberts of Colorado, who informed the convention that she came from a State where men had the courage and the chivalry to grant to women the right which they demanded for themselves. "We of Colorado," she exclaimed—"I mean we of Louisiana—(laughter) second the nomination of Mr. Bryan." Mrs. Roberts withdrew amid applause.

Henry W. Call of New York was deputed to speak for Maine. He spoke of the proposed "marriage" between Populism and Democracy; declared that he knew of a just and lawful impediment, and exclaimed that, in the name of common sense, he forbade the bans. (Laughter.) He was proceeding to oppose the nomination of Bryan, when the Chairman (Senator Allen) called the attention of the Maine delegation to the fact that it was understood to second Bryan's nomination.

The Chairman proved to be right, and Field of Virginia declared angrily that Call was abusing the confidence of the convention and was not a Populist at all.

The Chairman asked the New York delegation if Call was a Populist, and the answer was that he had been a member of the party only two weeks, and had attended but one meeting. Mr. Call, when finally permitted to proceed, concluded by nominating Hon. G. F. Norton of Chicago.

E. Ferry Brown of Massachusetts spoke for his State. He said he was no longer for his party; he was here for his country. There was no party. On both sides there were two forces fighting, and there was no middle road. Whoever was in the middle of the road was dead

WANT PROTECTIVE PRINCIPLES RESTORED.

Window-Glass Workers Call Upon the Republican Nominee.

Have No Fear of Their Dollars If the Tariff is Regulated

On Such Principles as to Best Protect American Industries and to Insure Sufficient Funds to Meet the Necessary Expenses of the Government—Major McKinley's Reply to the Spokesman of the Delegation.

CANTON (O.), July 25.—Perhaps the most important delegation which has come to Canton since the nomination of Major McKinley to call upon him was the delegation which arrived this morning from Pittsburg. It numbered over 400, and was made up of delegates to the eighth National Convention of the Window-Glass Workers from New York, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Michigan, Illinois, Ohio, Delaware and Maryland, representing the real industrial classes in those States and not the politicians or professional laboring men.

Their spokesman, Henry Bostwick of Indiana, said the issue which appealed most directly, personally and powerfully to the man who works in the factory, foundry or ship is the tariff. "The workmen who came to Canton, and they have been here in large numbers," said Bostwick, "have the notion firmly fixed in their minds that the present tariff law is responsible for their present lack of prosperity. We want the protective principles restored. We are satisfied with the quality of our dollars, and have no fear of the volume of our money if the tariff is so regulated and levied on such principles as to best protect American industries, and to insure sufficient funds to meet the necessary expenses of the Government."

This sentiment was the keynote of the speech. When Major McKinley rose to respond he was greeted with prolonged applause and hearty cheers. He said in part:

"Nothing could be better said than that a great essential to the credit of our country is to provide enough revenue to run the country. The credit of any Government is imperiled so long as it expects more money than it collects. The credit of the Government, like that of the individual citizen, is best subserved by living within its means and providing means with which to live. Every citizen must know that the receipts of the United States are now insufficient for its necessary expenditures, and that our present revenue laws have resulted in causing a deficiency in the treasury for almost three years.

"It has been demonstrated, too, that no relief can be had through the present Congress. The relief rests with the people themselves. They are charged with the election of a new Congress in November, which can alone give the needed relief. If they elect a Republican Congress the whole world knows that one of its first acts will be to put upon the statute books of the country a law under which the Government will collect enough money to meet its expenditures, stop debts and deficiencies, and adequately protect American labor. (Great cheers and applause.) This would be one of the surest steps toward the return of confidence and a revival of business prosperity. (Applause.)
