FOURTH OF JULY BUSINESS.

All Bills Paid Up by the Executive Committee.

Recommendation That Money be Raised in Future by Levying a Small Tax.

The Executive Committee of the Fourth of July celebration held a meeting last night and settled up its affairs as far as possible. All bills known to be outstanding were ordered paid, and the Secretary was instructed to collect some sums yet due from subscribers and to pay any further demands that may come to the surface.

The following report was received from the Finance Committee, signed by R. D. Stephens (Chairman) and was adopted:

To the Fourth of July Executive Committee—Gentlemen: Your Finance Committee beg leave to report specially that the Board of Supervisors of Sacramento County and the Board of Trustees of Sacramento City each donated the sum of \$800 to defray the expenses of our late celebration.

Your committee, while engaged in soliciting subscriptions from business firms and individuals, report that it was the almost unanimous sentiment that the funds for defraying the expenses of our future celebrations should be raised by a direct tax levy. We therefore recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

"Resolved, That it is the sense of the Executive Committee, having charge of the late Fourth of July celebration that the expenses of such future celebrations should be derived from a general tax levy; and be it further

"Resolved, That the City Board of Trustees and the County Board of Supervisors are hereby requested to take such action as may be necessary to include in their general tax levy a provision for a special Fourth of July Fund in an amount sufficient to defray all reasonable expenses."

AMUSEMENTS.

A very fine audience at the Clunie Opera-house last night greeted the opening of the last week of the Moulton Dramatic company. In variety is what the theatergoers want, they assuredly had it last night, for the entertainment was quadruple. Mr. Loneragan and Miss Dallas gave the Kendals pretty comedy curtain-raiser, "The Baron's Wager." It was excellently played and proved that the stronger points of Mr. Moulton's company are just being discovered. Mr. Loneragan was not supposed to be possessed of the versatility he is now manifesting, nor Miss Dallas of the fine art she displays in sentimental efforts and refined comedy. Next came the beautiful one-act play, "A Game of Cards," presenting Mr. Gibney in the best work he has done here, as fine a bit of character acting in an old man part as one might wish to see. He was ably supported by Mr. Loneragan, Mr. Stockbridge and Miss Yantis. The third play was the rattling farce, "Two Jim Dandies," with Mr. Moulton in the lead, and capital as in all he does. But Miss Harrington took the part by an extravagant bit of hysterical legerie. The support by Miss Claves, who is clever and prepossessing, Miss Stuart, Mr. Stockbridge and Mr. Sellery, was acceptable, but will be bettered to-night, when Mr. Sellery shall have captured the fleeting lines of his part.

Between the second and third pieces Tyndall, the mild reader, gave a very successful exhibition of his powers. Every feat he attempted he accomplished, and he won applause sufficient to gratify any reasonable desire for commendation. He had the aid of a large committee which showed him no favors. The best work he did was in finding hidden articles and describing persons' thought of and the characteristics of their costume. Whether it is "muscle suggestion," or whatever the method, his work is exceedingly clever, especially the feat of finding three ladies to whom another lady had awarded three ribbons, which were afterwards hidden. He found the ribbons, and then placed each with the person with whom they had been originally placed. To-night the same feat was a matter of "mind reading" by Tyndall.

At 7 o'clock last evening Tyndall, the mild reader, had a great crowd in front of the opera-house. A committee consisting of Dr. F. D. Tyrell, Dr. F. F. Tebbitts, C. M. Beckwith, O. P. Dodge, Arthur Wilson, K. L. Johnson, Charles Farran and P. M. Woodson drove in Wilson's large surry from the opera-house up K to Tenth, to L, to Seventh, where they secreted an officer's badge upon an upper ledge of the base of the Stevens monument and placed a committee to watch it. They then returned to the opera-house, where Tyndall had remained in charge of still another committee. He was then blindfolded and conducted to the vehicle. He instantly mounted, seized the reins, and with one hand in the hand of one of the committee and the other holding the reins, drove at a furious pace over the route the committee had taken, and so fast as to alarm the occupants of the vehicle, and make those on the streets scatter to get out of the way. He found the badge instantly on alighting at the Plaza. At Eighth and L streets the committeeman whose hand he held caused Tyndall to drive in a circle entirely around the crossing by suggesting it mentally, as the committeeman reports. No one communicated any direction to the operator while in the vehicle or before, and but one pause was made, when Tyndall changed one of the committee to the seat beside him, as being "more sensitive in thought," as he put it, than the man with whom he set out on the journey. It was a clever feat and was carried out to the letter of the promise. However done it was neatly accomplished. When Tyndall attempted the same feat here five or six years ago he fainted and suffered in what was pronounced a severe epileptic fit.

At Fifteenth and M streets this afternoon at 2 and to-night at 8 o'clock, Monroe's shows will give two entertainments, introducing all the ring-rings, trick animal feats, tumbling, athletic and gymnastic exercises of the company.

He stepped down to get an article in the bottom of the buggy, when the horse started and threw him to the ground and the vehicle passed over his back, injuring him so severely that he has not been able to speak since. MUCH COOLER.

Another Flashed Drop in the Weather Indicator. The Weather Bureau reports show the highest and lowest temperatures yesterday to have been 86 and 58 degrees, with fresh to brisk southerly winds and clear with the prevailing breeze. The barometrical readings at 5 a. m. and 5 p. m. yesterday were 29.93 and 29.91 inches, respectively. The highest and lowest temperatures one year ago yesterday were 88 and 60 degrees, and one year ago to-day 86 and 57 degrees. The dry thermometer at 5 a. m. was

60 degrees, and the wet (sensible temperature) 58 degrees; wind southeast, twelve miles per hour, and weather clear.

The dry thermometer at 5 p. m. was 74 degrees, and the wet (sensible temperature) 63 degrees; wind southwest, eighteen miles per hour, and weather clear.

The average temperature was 72 degrees and the normal 74 degrees, showing yesterday to have been 2 degrees cooler than the normal for July 27th.

SUED BY THE STATE.

Action to Recover Costs in a Case Long Ago Determined.

The case of the State against the Coulterville and Yosemite Turnpike Company was argued before Judge Johnson yesterday and will be submitted on briefs.

The suit is against the company and its bondsmen to recover the sum of \$500 paid out by the State for attorney's fees in defending an action brought by the company some years ago for \$100,000 damages. The company lost its case in the trial court and appealed. In order to do this it had to give a bond to cover the expenses of the suit in case the judgment should be affirmed.

The judgment was affirmed, and the State was obliged to bring this suit to recover the money it had paid out in the way of costs. Assistant Attorneys-General Anderson and Post appeared for the State, and G. H. Mastick of Alameda for the defendants.

His Arm Injured.

While sailing a boat on the river yesterday a Washington boy named Charles Scully was struck on the arm by the boom, lacerating the flesh from the shoulder to the elbow. His injury was dressed at the City Receiving Hospital.


