#### EXPRESSIONS OF INTERIOR CALIFORNIA NEWSPAPERS.

#### Comments Upon Things Local, Governmental, Practical, Theoretical and Current.

**Oroville Register:** The present campaign must be one of education. It must be one of facts and figures, not of mere assertions and declarations. If we could form clubs and discuss the great issues of the day it would bring better results than in mere stump speeches. The whole body of people are talking this question of free silver. Let us hold meetings and invite public discussion. It would have a good effect in more ways than one.

**Fresno Republican:** The Republican party has demonstrated its capability in administering the affairs of Government. It has kept its promises, and prosperity has been the prevailing condition under its Administration. It is the aggressive champion of protection and reciprocity, which policy will more quickly bring an industrial revival, not only at home, but in our trade relations with those foreign countries which now sell us their products but buy from Europeans, than all the financial reforms that can possibly be effected by the disorganized and discredited Democracy.

This shows that the gentleman who gained the nomination by his elocutionary effort at Chicago has a very limited stock of phrases at his command, and suggests the probability that he lacks the training and breadth of knowledge of Governmental affairs to justify entrusting him with the chief magistracy.

**THE RESULT THE SAME.** The nomination of Bryan by the Populists and so-called Silver party delegates does not, in fact, change the situation, and the result will be the same when the ballots are counted. The electors who go to the polls November 3d will know more of what is meant by free and unlimited coinage of silver than the 36 than they do now. Bryan is a radical advocate of the white metal and has for more than a year been a paid advocate to boom the cause of silver. He was elected a Representative in Congress by a combination of Democrats and Populists, but he could not succeed to a second term. All of the electors who believe in the policy of forcing upon the people exactly as easily as possible a dollar which will vote for Bryan, and they would have done that if the Populists had not nominated him.

**A TRUE TEST OF HONESTY.** Humboldt Standard: A friend called yesterday to ask what is meant by honest money. The test when coin is referred to is this: Take a given amount of gold coin, say \$100, and melt it; take \$100 in silver coin and melt it also; then melt what each lump of metal is worth in the world's markets. If one money is as good as the other the metal of which it is made will be worth the same amount. If you will try the experiment you will find that the metal in the \$100 of gold coin will be worth a hundred dollars, and the silver worth about fifty-three dollars; it would not bring more than that in any kind of useful money. Which then is the honest money? Coin is supposed to be made of full value. The metal in it should be worth what is stamped on its face. Paper money is merely a promise to pay; a bank or Government note.

**Curious Book Titles.** In the department of the "Overland" called "As Talked in the Sanctum," the following is spoken by the "Reader": "I have across the titles a lot of curious old books of Cromwell's time. They rival our modern appellations of 'The Tinted Venus,' 'The Gilded Sin,' and 'The Heavenly Twins.' Listen: 'The Christian Sodality; or Catholic Hive of Bees, Sucking the Honey of the Churches' Prayer from the Blossoms of the Word of God; 'The Saints to Smell at'; 'A Reaping-Hook, Well-tempered for the Rotten Ears of the Coming Crop; or, Biscuit Baked in the Oven of Charity, Carefully Conserved for the Chickens of the Church, the Sparrows of the Spirit, and the Sweet Swallows of Salvation.' 'Eggs of Charity, Layed by the Chickens of the Water of Divine Love, Taken by the Eat.' 'Hooks and Eyes for Believers' Breaches. 'High-heeled Shoes for Dwarfs in Holiness.' 'The Spiritual Mustard Pot, to Make the Soul Sweat with Devotion.' \* \* \* As I went through a list of these archaic book-captions the thought came to me that I might bring some name to the circle by indicating a bibelot on 'The Fashion in Book Titles—How They Change.' There is a fashion in naming of new books—that is novels. In Thackeray, Dickens, and Lever's day the name of the hero generally gave his name to the volume. J. Fenimore Cooper, Victor Hugo, and many others have followed this fashion, and titles, while Charles Reade and Wilkie Collins went in for mystery. Today the title is more often chosen without regard to anything between covers, like Artemus Ward's celebrated lecture on 'The Babes in the Wood'—for example, 'Ships That Pass in the Night'—or for pure sentimentalism, 'An Amazing Marriage; A Sawdust Doll; 'Two Women and a Fool; 'Three Men in a Boat.'"

**VENEZUELAN DISPUTE.** The Question Comes Up in the House of Commons. LONDON, July 27.—The Venezuelan question was again brought up in the House of Commons to-day by an interrogatory by John Morley, formerly Chief Secretary for Ireland, who asked for information regarding the papers on the subject recently upon the table of the House. In replying to the question, the Right Secretary of the Foreign Office, said that the statement in defense of Venezuela's claim recently submitted to the American High Commission had not yet reached the Foreign Office. When it was received it would be laid upon the table. Mr. Morley then asked further questions germane to the subject, in reply to which the Right Hon. Joseph Chamberlain, Secretary of State for the Colonies, said that he was unable to give the information asked for. He added that the dispute could only be determined by negotiation and afterward by local inquiry.

**WILL VOTE FOR MCKINLEY.** A Democrat Who Cannot Indorse the Chicago Convention's Sentiments. AUGUSTA (Me.), July 27.—In a letter to Hon. A. J. Staples of this city, President Hyde of Bowdoin College, who is a Democrat, announces that he shall vote the Republican ticket. He gives his reasons as follows: "The maintenance of financial integrity, respect for judicial authority, the promotion of civil service reform, the preservation of the standard according to which contracts have been made by which savings are secured and in which labor is to be paid, cannot be entrusted to a party committed to the absurd and monstrous platform adopted at Chicago."

**Champion Revolver Shot.** LONDON, July 27.—Walter Winans of Boston, who has held for eight consecutive years the revolver championship of the South London Rifle Club, and for three consecutive years the championship of the North London Rifle Club, has won twelve first and two second prizes in the Blizley Revolver competition, also the championship for revolver shooting.

**Death of a Niece of Gov. Morton.** LONDON, July 27.—Mrs. Mahlon Sands, daughter of the late Mr. Hart-pond of New York, and a niece of Governor Levi P. Morton, died from heart disease on Friday last at her residence in this city.

FORTSVILLE (Pa.), July 27.—By an explosion of gas at the Bear Ridge colliery this afternoon, Michael Brazier, Preston Hill, William Quinn and Boss Connors Patch were killed and James Mulaney was injured, perhaps fatally.

### Disastrous Fire.

BELFAST, July 27.—The great ship building yards of Harland Wolf in this city were burned to-day. The loss is \$1,250,000. They covered eighty acres. The firm employed upward of 9,000 hands.

### ORDINANCE NO. 49.

#### Creating the Office of Veterinary Inspector and Prescribing His Duties.

The Board of Supervisors of the County of Sacramento do ordain as follows: Section 1. The office of Veterinary Inspector of the county of Sacramento, State of California, is hereby created, and immediately after this ordinance shall take effect the Board of Supervisors of the county of Sacramento shall elect a veterinary surgeon to fill said office, who shall hold office at the pleasure of said board, and for a term of one year, and shall at all times, and all necessary traveling expenses incurred while engaged in performance of his duties, the amount not to exceed the sum of twenty-five dollars per month. No person shall be eligible to this office who shall not be a duly qualified veterinary surgeon holding a certificate from the State Veterinary Medical Board, which certificate shall have been recorded in the office of the County Clerk of the county of Sacramento, and who shall not be an elector of the county of California.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of said Veterinary Inspector to visit all dairies, slaughter-houses, markets and other places from which milk, meat, poultry, fish or game are sold or supplied for human food, and inspect the sanitary condition of all places from which said articles of food are distributed. He shall inspect all living animals intended to be slaughtered, and all meat, poultry, fish or game offered or intended to be offered for sale or human food, and shall at all times, for the purpose of inspection, have free access to all dairies, or other places from which milk, meat, poultry, fish or game are sold, or offered to be sold, or distributed for human food, and any refusal to permit such entry and access on any resistance thereof shall be deemed a misdemeanor.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of said Veterinary Inspector to examine and test all domestic animals within the county of Sacramento as affected with any infectious or contagious disease, and to cause said animals to be destroyed, or to cause the necessary examination or test according to the rules laid down by the United States Bureau of Animal Industry from which he shall obtain his diagnostic agents, and if said animal is found to be affected with any contagious or infectious incurable disease said Veterinary Inspector shall at once advise the owner or person in whose possession said animal shall be, that said animal is so affected and request him to destroy said animal.

Section 4. Upon the discovery of any animal affected with any contagious or infectious disease he shall prescribe and apply such rules and regulations as in his judgment the case may require for the suppression and eradication of the disease.

Section 5. Said Veterinary Inspector shall keep a record of all examinations and tests made by him and file a monthly report thereof with the Board of Supervisors of the county of Sacramento.

Section 6. The Board of Supervisors shall employ such assistants and furnish such supplies and material as may be necessary in carrying into effect the provisions of this ordinance.

All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 7. This ordinance shall take effect from and after its publication in the official publication.
