

THE FRESNO RESOLUTIONS.

Condemned by the Union Printers of Sacramento.

A Strong Remonstrance Adopted at a Meeting Held Last Evening.

Typographical Union No. 46 held a special meeting last night at Trades Union Hall to consider the resolutions adopted at the Fresno Convention reflecting on the management of the State Printing Office.

After thoroughly discussing the subject, the following resolutions were adopted: "Whereas, State Typographical Union, No. 6, which met in the city of Fresno on August 13 and 14, 1896, adopted resolutions in one of which the following language appears: 'It is also brought to our notice that the California State Printing Office has been conducted in a manner that reflects discredit on the craft of this State'; and

"Whereas, the subject matter of said resolution had never been canvassed or discussed by any of the subordinate unions represented at said State Typographical Union, and the delegates thereto had never been instructed to consider or take action in relation thereto; and

"Whereas, said State Typographical Union therefore acted without official information or authority in the passage of such a resolution, in which the integrity of fellow-craftsmen in good standing is gratuitously and publicly assailed without investigation and without cause; and

"Whereas, such action by the State Typographical Union could have only been induced by the most malicious misrepresentations and most untruthful assaults upon the integrity and good name of our local craftsmen, inspired, as we believe, by some one who imagines that he has a grievance against the present State Printer, Hon. A. J. Johnston; therefore be it

"Resolved, That Sacramento Typographical Union, No. 46, in meeting assembled, do hereby disclaim being a party to the unwarranted attack on organized labor made by the State Typographical Union at Fresno, and also affirms that our delegate to said State Typographical Union was not instructed or expected to assail his own union, or any part thereof.

"Resolved, That we emphatically repudiate and condemn the Fresno resolution above quoted, and resent the imputation that our fellow-members employed at the State Printing Office are a discredit to the craft of this State.

"Resolved, That we disapprove the attitude of E. I. Woodman, our only delegate to the State Typographical Union at Fresno, in his acquiescence in the passage of the resolution referred to.

"Resolved, That we heartily approve the action of State Printer Johnston in the preference he has always shown organized labor in the exclusive employment of Union men in the various departments of the State Printing Office, and we gratefully acknowledge his valuable aid in preventing a reduction of wages in said office, thus assisting in the maintenance of a fair standard of wages throughout the State.

"Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be sent to Governor James H. Budd, to sister unions throughout the State, and to the press, under the seal of this union.

HOP PICKING.

About to Begin at Wheatland—Work for Idle Men.

A correspondent writing to the "Record-Union" from Wheatland says: "Hop picking commences at Wheatland on Thursday. The Bear River crop is promising for both quality and yield.

"The total crop this season will, however, be nearly 150 tons short, owing to a decreased acreage. The expected yield will be 900 tons. The wheatland hops are picked by white labor entirely. There is a general exodus now to Wheatland from all points, and several hundred more people can be given employment here."

STRUCK A SNAG.

The Grain Barge Varuna Sunk Near Colusa.

On Sunday last the grain barge Varuna, on her way down from Colusa, struck a snag when near Grimes' Landing and went to the bottom with 7,000 sacks of barley.

The cargo is a total loss to Gavin & Ayer of San Francisco, who had just bought the grain and had not insured it. The Varuna was one of the old-time river barges, and thought to be proof against ordinary snags.

The Court-Martial.

Captain J. D. Schoemaker sat in judgment last evening at the court-martial for hearing the evidence in the case of Dorsey Luttrell, a private in Company G, who is charged with absenting himself from three consecutive assemblages of his company.

The result of the inquiry will be made known later on orders from headquarters. The penalty, in case of conviction, is quite severe.

Articles of Incorporation.

The Ferndale Electric Light Company filed articles of incorporation with the Secretary of State yesterday. The Directors are W. D. Campbell, J. A. Shaw, C. H. Boynton, W. S. Wright and C. T. Schreiner, all of Ferndale, Humboldt County. The amount of capital stock is \$10,000, of which \$3,000 is subscribed.

Captain Ash and Officers Douglas and Footie raided Gow Chang's Chinese lottery game last night, on Third street, and captured the whole outfit. The capture was made in the rear of Gus Burnett's saloon at Third and K.

NEW YORK FOR MCKINLEY.

General Woodruff Estimates Over 100,000 Plurality.

CANTON (O.), Aug. 17.—Major McKinley returned from Cleveland at 1 o'clock this afternoon. To-morrow at 11 o'clock several hundred of the colored citizens of Cleveland will call on Major McKinley. They will come from the Forest City by special train with a band and the Major is expected to make them a long speech.

More telegrams were received to-day announcing the formation of McKinley clubs. General and Mrs. Stuart L. Woodford arrived in Canton to-night and spent the evening at the McKinley residence. General Woodford discussed at length the situation in New York with Major McKinley. He said the Republicans were sure to carry New York, and he thinks the Republican national ticket will have between one and two hundred thousand plurality. He estimates the sound money vote at about 75,000.

PINGREE IN NEW YORK.

Foraker Confident That Ohio is for McKinley.

NEW YORK, Aug. 17.—Mayor H. E. Pingree of Detroit, who has been nominated by the Republicans of Michigan for the Governorship, arrived in New York to-day and is a guest at the Murray Hill Hotel. He expressed himself as confident that both the national and State Republican tickets would be successful in Michigan.

Senator Foraker arrived to-day. He will sail for Europe Wednesday on the steamship St. Paul to meet his daughter. He expects to return by the middle of September and to make speeches before the campaign closes.

To a reporter he said that he had no fears whatever about Ohio. "The people in Ohio are not silver crazy and they will stand by the Republican party and sound money," he said. "Where one Republican is converted to free silver, at least 100 Democrats declare for McKinley and sound money. That shows the drift out West."

General John W. Foster, ex-Secretary of State, also arrived to-day. He went out early and it was said would meet some prominent Republicans.

Ex-Congressman Neldringhaus of Missouri, who was at the Waldorf Hotel, said a great many Democrats in St. Louis had openly repudiated the Bryan ticket. As to the State, he thought it debatable ground, and that the Republicans stood a splendid chance to win.

Cuban Expedition Landed.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 17.—Information was received here to-day by the Cuban revolutionary party that an expedition consisting of 45 men and a large quantity of war munitions was landed in Cuba on last Thursday. The expedition originally set out from this country and went to a South American port, from which place the landing was made. A number of Americans, including several Philadelphians, are said to have been in the party.
