

PHOTOGRAPHERS ORDINANCE.

Trustees Repeal the Old One and Pass a New One.

The Fifteen Special Policemen Will Not be Appointed Till Next Week.

The City Board of Trustees held its regular weekly meeting last night, Trustees Leonard, Wachhorst, Kent, Davis, McKay, Devine, Tozer and Pennish being present, and Leonard presiding.

L. T. Hatfield addressed the board relative to the deepening of the Thirty-first street canal, and asking on behalf of the East Park Association that action be taken in that direction before the rains set in and flood the park again. He claimed that the present situation was the result of the city's action in filling up Burns' Slough. The water cannot be reached by the pumping plant. He asked that the board refer the matter to the Corporation Counsel, to report on the legal aspect of the matter.

The matter was so referred. T. A. W. Shock, for the Sacramento Electric, Gas and Power Company, said that part of the board attended the test of the Alameda fender on its cars, and he would like to have a full attendance of the board to see a thorough test made.

Wachhorst said the test was perfectly satisfactory to the four members who were present.

Devine said the fender was the best he had ever seen, but he wanted the Corporation Counsel's opinion as to the liability of the city for damage by accidents in case the Trustees approved the fender.

It was decided that the board would attend a test of the fender on Wednesday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

Mr. Shock called attention to the wording of the advertisement for bids on the pumping plant, which only allowed for a bid for electric power on the smallest pump. He suggested that the specifications be changed so as to prepare for a change on the other pumps to electric power if it is found that it will be a saving.

In answer to a question by Devine he said that electricity would make a saving of 33 to 50 per cent. over steam to the city.

Kent moved that the matter be referred to the Sewer Committee, to be reported on next Monday night. Devine moved as an amendment that the City Surveyor prepare specifications for constructing a foundation for motors, to be included in the bids.

The amendment was carried. Frank McKee, representing a San Francisco firm, stated that it could not prepare a bid on the specifications by next Monday night, and asked for a week's further time.

The President said it could not be granted without advertising over again. MAYOR'S MESSAGES.

The following messages from the Mayor were read: INCAPACITATED HOSEMAN.

To the Honorable Board of Trustees: I herewith transmit to you a communication from the Chief of the Fire Department requesting that the position of hoseman of Engine Company No. 1, held by N. Stephano, be declared vacant for the reason that said N. Stephano is not now, nor will he ever be,

able physically to perform the duties pertaining to said position. Respectfully submitted, C. H. HUBBARD, Mayor.

DRAINAGE BOND ELECTION. To the Honorable Board of Trustees: I return you herewith, with my approval indorsed thereon, ordinance No. 429, entitled "An ordinance declaring the result of the special election held in the city of Sacramento on the 11th day of August, 1896, pursuant to ordinance No. 429 of said city, and providing for the issuance of the bonds voted for at said election."

I also return you herewith, with my approval indorsed thereon, ordinance No. 430, entitled "An ordinance providing for the levy and collection of a tax for the purpose of paying the annual interest on \$65,000 worth of bonds to be issued by the city of Sacramento, and to pay a proportionate amount of the principal of said bonds." The matter of Hoseman Stephano was referred to the Fire Department Committee, to be reported on next week. The usual bills were allowed. When that of Robert W. Ash, acting Police Captain, was read, Kent asked that it be laid aside, as he wished to speak in relation to it.

The bill of J. M. Harlow for services as policeman and that of M. B. Horne as machinist were rejected. Kent said he and Ash were friends, but two weeks ago the board reinstated Anthony Greene as Police Captain. The charter reads that the Captain of Police shall hold his office till his successor is appointed and confirmed, and no one else than the city can be Captain.

He moved the bill be referred back for correction, so that it could be amended that Greene would get his proper proportion of the pay; and that Greene's bill be also referred back that it might be amended and augmented. So ordered.

Several bills incurred by the Street Superintendent were laid over to be indorsed with a Trustee's order.

COMMITTEE REPORTS. Davis, for the Water Committee, reported that he had ordered a bin constructed for holding hard coal for use in case of fires, and that the coal would be in it soon.

Devine, for the Street Committee, said that the Y-street pumping plant was not properly guarded and should have a watchman.

Kent, for the Fire Department Committee reported in favor of allowing the Sacramento Electric, Gas and Power Company to put in an alarm gong and connect it with the fire-alarm system. So ordered.

He also reported adversely on the application for a fire alarm box at Twenty-third and H streets.

Leonard said that he had investigated and found that it would be safer and better to put in twenty telephones to connect with the Corporation House than to put in old boxes, which are not reliable. They can also be used by the police.

The matter was referred to the Fire Department Committee.

Leonard reported regarding sign ordinances that he and the Mayor proposed to consult with prominent sign painters in relation to the shape of signs overhanging the sidewalk.

Kent said there were some dangerous crossings in the northern part of town that should be filled in. He suggested that the Street Superintendent be instructed to procure three carloads of crushed rock and attend to them immediately. So ordered, to the amount of \$45.

The Chief Engineer of the Fire Department was instructed to advertise for bids for printing 250 copies of his annual report. In regard to the Mayor's request for the appointment of special policemen for the full term of the fair, the board decided they were not needed at present.

The position of special policeman for the Golden Eagle was asked by the proprietors to be created. Kent objected to creating the position if he was to be used to drive away the hackmen from the front of the hotel, but being told that he was only wanted inside he withdrew his objection, and the office was created.

Wachhorst said complaint had been made of a heap of stone at Fourteenth and H streets. He moved that the Superintendent of Streets be instructed to remove it.

Street Superintendent Croly said the stones were hauled there for street crossings, and there had been no money to pay for putting them down. The matter was laid over till after the fair.

The City Surveyor reported recommending that M. Dubois be allowed to repair his sidewalk on Second street, between K and L, and the Y. M. C. A. the same privilege on Sixth street.

The permission was granted. The request of B. N. Bugby to be allowed to build his sidewalk on its present grade was referred to the whole board for one week.

Leonard was opposed to letting citizens fix their own grades for sidewalks and the lines for the fences on their lots.

McKay said a woman who has a dairy has asked the board for permission to use the old plaza at Twenty-seventh and Twenty-eighth, B and C streets, and will keep up the fence and fill up the holes if allowed to use it for a year. Permission was granted.

STREET IMPROVEMENT. Bids for improving Nineteenth street from C to H with macadam were opened and the bids were William F. Bryant and the City Street Improvement Company. They were referred to the City Surveyor.

On recommendation of the Corporation Counsel, the claims of M. Kishi for \$1,000 and S. Kimoto for \$500, for damages to their gardens by overflow were rejected.

SALOON LICENSES. S. Schlutius was granted an all-night saloon license at 210 K street. William J. Hook was granted an all-night license at 810 K street, and E. B. Porter one at 1024 Third street. Hyams & Waters, 607 K street, were also granted one, as was R. Grosse, 324 K street.

MISCELLANEOUS. The Corporation Counsel reported that all was in readiness for printing the sewerage bonds and the matter was referred to the Finance Committee with power to act.

He also presented an ordinance allowing the City Board of Education to sell the east half of lot 2, in the block between O and P, Ninth and Tenth streets, which was laid over for a week. He also presented an ordinance amending the photographers' ordinance, reducing the license to \$15 a quarter for canvassers.

Tozer moved that it be laid over for a week, but Devine moved that it be passed immediately, to allow the canvassers to go on and make a living. It had been postponed from week to week for a long time.

Wachhorst said it would enable one large company to put on fifty canvassers and pay only \$15 a quarter for the whole number. Devine moved to amend by making

each canvasser pay the \$15 a quarter, and Leonard thought it would be a fair proposition, both as a source of revenue to the city and protection to the local photographers, and he seconded the motion.

The ordinance was so amended and adopted, and the section of the former ordinance on the same subject was repealed.

The Superintendent of Streets recommended that Fifteenth street be swept in the same terms as the other streets, and it was so ordered.

Max Golitz presented a claim for \$740 for damages from sewage, which was rejected.

A request was made for an electric light at Fifteenth and K streets. W. Turton asked permission to connect his premises at K street, between Sixth and Seventh, directly with the sewer, but the President said the ordinance would not allow it. Devine then moved that the Clerk be instructed to have an ordinance drawn up repealing the present ordinance, as the city is ready, he stated, to take care of the sewage, and Mr. Turton should not be compelled to construct a vault.

The matter was then dropped. The City Surveyor reported that the City Improvement Company was the lowest bidder on the improvement of Thirteenth street. He had figured the cost of the street, and it would come to \$1 35 a front foot and \$2 20 for macadam per cubic yard.

The contract was awarded to the City Improvement Company. The Clerk was instructed to advertise for three heaters, one for each engine-house for keeping hot water, in order that the engines can get up steam quickly at a fire.

The board then adjourned.

WEATHER AND CROPS.

But Little Damage Done by the Recent Rainstorm.

The following synopsis of the weather and crop conditions during the week ending Monday, August 31st, is issued by the State Agricultural Society, in conjunction with the United States Climate and Crop Service, James A. Barwick, Section Director.

The average temperature for the week ending Monday, August 31st, was as follows for the Weather Bureau stations named: Eureka, 60, Fresno 78, Los Angeles 74, Red Bluff 78, Sacramento 70, San Francisco 60 and San Diego 72 degrees.

As compared with the normal temperature there was an excess of heat of 4 degrees at Eureka, 2 at Los Angeles and 3 degrees at San Diego, while heat deficiencies were shown at all other stations as follows: Fresno and San Francisco 1 degree, Sacramento 2 degrees and Red Bluff reported normal conditions to have prevailed, as far as temperature was concerned.

The rainfall was: Eureka, .60 of an inch, Fresno .15 of an inch, Los Angeles a sprinkle, Red Bluff .50 of an inch, Sacramento .20 of an inch, San Francisco and San Diego .10 of an inch. As compared with the normal precipitation there were excesses reported from all stations.

The rain of the 29th and 30th injured fruit that was exposed on the drying trays and has damaged hay that was in the field, and also some grain that remained unthreshed.

Rain grapes were not injured, because picking had not commenced in a general way, and there were none on the trays. There was, then, no damage to that crop.

The precipitation of .20 of an inch at Sacramento was the greatest ever before known to have fallen during the month of August in a record of forty-seven years. In fact, there were but four Augusts out of forty-seven that gave rain enough to measure.

There was a severe thunder and lightning storm twelve miles from Fresno, where five mules were killed by lightning and the driver of a harvester was stunned by the shock. The extraordinary and very unusual phenomena of heavy rains in August has not injured any of the growing or maturing crops of the State.

The highest and lowest temperatures were 108 at Picocho, San Diego County, and 40 at Hollister, San Benito County.

OUTPUT OF FRUIT.

Twenty-Four Carloads Forwarded for the East Yesterday.

Fruit shipments are holding up remarkably well considering the lateness of the season. Yesterday twenty-four carloads started over the mountains for Eastern markets. On the corresponding day last year, 28 cars were sent the same journey.

Of the fruit so shipped, 4 carloads were peaches, 3/4 plums, 3/8 grapes and 1 1/2 pears. It will be distributed to Eastern points in carload lots as follows: Chicago, peaches 1, grapes 1/2, pears 3/4-7, New York, peaches 1/2, plums 1/4, grapes 3/8, pears 3/8-5, Boston, peaches 1/2, plums 1/4, grapes 1/2, pears 1/2-2, St. Paul, peaches 1/4, grapes 1/4, pears 1/2-1, Omaha, peaches 1, grapes 1/2, pears 3/4-2, Cleveland, pears 1, Milwaukee, peaches 1/4, grapes 1/4, pears 1/2-1, Other points, peaches 3/4, plums 1/4, grapes 1/4, pears 2 3/4-5.

LIVED HIGH FOR TWO MONTHS

How a Young Man Got Something for Nothing.

A. H. Stein Charged With Fraud and Forgery - But Where is He?

Early in July a man of good address, giving the name of A. H. Stein, came to this city. He met a fellow-mechanic named Sweet, who is employed at the railroad company's shops, to whom he stated that he had secured employment at the shops and asked to be recommended to some good boarding-house.

Accordingly he was sent by Sweet to the Palace restaurant, where he made a similar statement as to his employment. Every day he came to his meals as regular as clockwork, like an honest mechanic, begrimed by (apparently) the dust of toil. Being a new employe, he stated to the proprietor that, according to the rules of the company, he would not receive his first pay for two months.

Yesterday being pay-day with the railroad employes, his creditor anxiously awaited his coming, but he did not put in an appearance at meal-time. His absence was explained when Sweet strolled into the restaurant and informed Mr. Schad, the proprietor, that his late boarder had "it out," leaving behind him indisputable evidence of his rascality.

It was found that he had gone to A. Cassell, a shoe dealer, and procuring an order alleged to have been written and signed by Sweet, procured a fine pair of shoes. When Sweet called later to settle with Cassell his own account he was startled by the presentation of an order bearing his signature. Sweet denied having given the order, and said that on the day it was dated he was in Nevada.

Investigation at the railroad shops showed that no person of the name of A. H. Stein was on the pay-roll there, and then the victims of the bogus mechanic began to realize that they had been uncoined.

Two warrants have been issued for Stein's arrest, one at the instigation of Sweet, charging him with forgery, and the other by Schad, charging him with obtaining goods by false pretenses. Stein is supposed to have gone south, and the officers thereabouts have been notified to be on the lookout for him.
