

OUR NATIVES AT STOCKTON.

The Sacramentans Will Cut a Very Wide Swath There.

Arrangements Made by the Local Parlors for the Admission Day Fete.

The Committee of Arrangements of Sunset Parlor, No. 26, Native Sons of the Golden West, having in charge an excursion to Stockton on the 9th inst., held an enthusiastic meeting last evening to make final arrangements for the comfort of their guests on that occasion.

The train will leave the passenger depot at 7:30 a. m. on the morning of the 9th, and returning will leave Stockton at 12:30 a. m. the morning of the 10th.

The uniforms of Sunset Parlor, as well as of the Capital City Drum Corps, who will act as escort, and that of California Parlor, No. 22, Native Daughters, and Dixon Parlor, No. 60, Native Sons, who will accompany Sunset Parlor as their guests, will be entirely of white, and will no doubt be one of the prettiest features in the parade at Stockton.

The parlor extends a cordial invitation to the citizens to accompany them and share their hospitality at the headquarters at Y. M. I. Hall at Stockton, and will do all in their power to make their visit pleasant.

California Parlor, partly under whose auspices the excursion is to be given, will be especially cared for by the members of Sunset Parlor. There will be a special place for them to make appointments to meet their lady friends and have a safe place where to leave their wraps, as well as the exclusive use of a dining-room in one of the principal hotels for them to take their meals with Sunset Parlor's members.

From information the committee has received they can safely guarantee the public a sight well worth going to Stockton to see, and as the price for the round trip is at the low figure of \$2, there will no doubt be a large crowd go with Sunset Parlor.

SACRAMENTO PARLOR.

Sacramento Parlor, No. 3, Native Sons of the Golden West, has engaged the entire Odd Fellows' building at Stockton, comprising three halls, to be used for their headquarters on Admission Day. One of them will be specially fitted for the convenience of ladies, and the others for reception purposes, where coffee, sandwiches and other light refreshments will be served.

The parlor does not propose to allow anyone to go hungry, nor want for other conveniences. The building is centrally located and directly opposite the Court-house, which will be the chiefly decorated building.

Sacramento Parlor will take with them the Militant Band of twenty-five pieces, and will wear uniforms of white duck trousers, blue coats, white corduroy caps and will carry parasols. They expect to "cut a swell" in the parade. As many as 125 of them have ordered uniforms.

They will be assisted by the Capital City Wheelmen, who will decorate their wheels and parade behind the band.

Sacramento Parlor will run an excursion train, leaving this city at 7 a. m. on the morning of the 9th and returning at 1 a. m. the next morning.

MISREPRESENTATION REBUKED.

What Really Was Said About Wealth as King.

(From the S. F. Bulletin, Aug. 31st.) Morris M. Estee, in answer to the charges laid against him for his purported saying "that in this country wealth is king in peace and war," writes to the "Bulletin":

Editor "Bulletin": In Sunday's "Examiner" I find the following statement, reported to have been made by me in my speech at the Auditorium on Saturday evening last:

"That in this country wealth is king in peace and in war."

I did not make this statement either in letter or in spirit. What I did say and what a copy of my speech, which the "Examiner" had in its possession, will disclose, is the following:

"THE DEBT-PAYING POWER OF THIS NATION. All over the world every producer is looking for a market for his products. Every human being is looking for something to do. Commercial and financial success is the highest achievement of this age. And so we must have protection or we will have cheap labor. Cheap labor is never intelligent labor, and all Americans must be intelligent or this republic cannot stand. This is the price we pay for liberty. Who can object to it?"

"The strength of a nation in peace and in war is no longer measured by the numbers of its soldiers. Its debt-paying power is its strength. Wealth is king in peace and in war. During Mr. Harrison's administration of four years, and immediately preceding Mr. Cleveland's, we paid on the principal of the national indebtedness \$230,000,000. During the first three years of Mr. Cleveland's administration the national indebtedness was increased \$202,000,000. This was not an accident."

"That is what I said and all I said relative to the power of wealth. The context indicates that the use of the expression so objected to by the 'Examiner' does not relate to the point which that journal is striving to make, and no intelligent, fair or truthful criticism of my speech could possibly sustain the position taken by that paper."

What I said in words and in spirit was that in modern times it was the wealth of a nation, and not the number of its soldiers, that gave it strength, and none but the most unfair and untruthful partisan criticism could construe it in any other light. Yours, M. M. ESTEE.
