WILLING TO SCRAP.

William Johnson, the Local Boxer, Issues a Challenge.

The "Bulletin's" sporting column last evening contained the following statement:

"William Johnson, instructor of the Sacramento Athletic Club, has written to the Occidental Club for an engagement. He says he will fight any heavy-weight on the coast, Choynski excepted."

Johnson is what is termed a light heavy-weight, having only recently become a little too heavy for the middle-weight limit. Some months ago he easily put out Australian Billy Smith, who has won some good battles and who gave Sharkey all he wanted to do to best him.

If Johnson has really decided to go outside the amateur ranks it will probably be an easy matter for him to get on a match with Van Buskirk, the Olympian heavy-weight, or Jeffries, the Los Angeles pugilistic giant. Or, Aleck Gregrains might be matched against him. Johnson's offer to take on any coast heavy-weight except Choynski is a pretty bold one for an amateur, for there are some well-seasoned second-class scrappers in the State. Still, although Johnson's work has been confined to giving instruction in boxing, if he will get in and exert his punishing powers, as well as his cleverness, he would doubtless hold his own with the best of them.

SUPREME COURT DECISIONS.

SYLLABUS. (Sac., No. 100—Department Two—Filed September 14, 1896.)

Maurice E. Power, respondent; E. A. May, Treasurer, appellant. Mandate to compel County Treasurer to pay warrant for commissions on moneys collected. Reversed and cause remanded with direction to trial court to deny plaintiff's motion for judgment and to permit defendant to file amended answer.

The complaint disclosed nothing of the nature or origin of the demand of the plaintiff for which the warrant was ordered drawn. If the demand was illegal, then indubitably the Treasurer was authorized to receive payment of it and to show this in his answer. The answer itself was imperfect and inaccurate, inasmuch as it denied matters not averred in the complaint. Nevertheless, it sufficiently set forth certain matters in defense and of those matters constituted a defense, then it would be good against demurrer and the court erred in rendering judgment upon the pleadings.
