



MINERALS OF CALIFORNIA.

State Mineralogist Crawford Files His Report.

Many Things That Will Interest Not Only the Miners, But Also the People.

State Mineralogist J. J. Crawford has filed his biennial report in the Governor's office for the two years ending September 15, 1896.

A glance at the table of contents shows that the State Mineralogist and his able corps of assistants have been actively engaged in the great work of discovery and development.

Chromite iron is to be found in Alameda, Calaveras, Del Norte, Fresno, Mendocino, Napa, San Luis Obispo, Santa Clara, Shasta, Sierra, and Siskiyou counties.

Gold is to be found in every county in the State, and in paying quantities in all the counties except fifteen.

Iron ore is found almost anywhere throughout the State, but only in extensive bodies in Del Norte, Humboldt, Napa, and Shasta counties.

Magnetite is found in Fresno, Napa, Santa Clara and Tulare counties, and manganese in Alameda, Del Norte, Marin, San Joaquin, Santa Clara and Sonoma counties.

The Mineralogist has also gone into the oil and gas fields, and compiled an interesting report on the petroleum subject.

Petroleum is found in Los Angeles, Alameda, Colusa, Contra Costa, Fresno, Napa, Santa Barbara, Santa Cruz, Solano and Tulare.

The largest quicksilver mines are in Santa Clara, Colusa, Napa, Lake, San Benito, San Luis Obispo, Siskiyou, Sonoma, Stanislaus, Trinity and Yolo.

Structural minerals are to be found all over the State, while marble may be found in nineteen of the different counties.

The report will include papers from a number of the scientific men of the State. John D. Isaacs has contributed an interesting paper on preservation of structural timbers.

One deposit, with special reference to the mother lode, is treated by Harold W. Fairbanks, Ph. D.; water power and compressed air transmission by Arthur DeWitt Foote.

Introducing his report, the State Mineralogist says: "I am pleased to say that continued activity has prevailed and still continues in nearly all lines of the mining industry, with every encouragement to still greater future development."

profitable and remunerative during the past few years. Statistics show that of all the industrial occupations gold mining is the safest and most profitable.

The average annual product or earning per capita in California of those engaged in farming is \$300; in manufacturing, including its bounties, \$1,000; in mining, with all its burdens and penalties, \$1,490.

"While the total value of all mineral products in California was \$18,806,261, our bulletins No. 7 and 8 for the years 1894 and 1895, respectively, show a gratifying increase in the former to \$26,208,266, and in the latter to \$22,844,644."

The report is accompanied by a requisition on the State Printer for 10,000 volumes. It will make a volume of about 750 pages and the expense will be close to \$10,000.

The printer's bill for the last biennial report was \$7,480, but it contained a third less matter than the present report. Not one of these reports can now be had and it is not likely that 10,000 copies will come anywhere near meeting the demand.

The work will be of great value to miners and its publication eagerly awaited.

CHINA GIN.

Hawkins Tried to Lower the Supply and Got 100 Days in Jail.

W. P. Hawkins was in the Police Court dock yesterday morning. The mere circumstance of his being there was not unusual, as of late his has been a familiar form, but the fact that he was charged with being a common drunk was out of the usual line of events.

He was sentenced by Judge Davis to serve 100 days in the County Jail.

Eastern Shipments of California Fruit Made Yesterday.

Thirty-four carloads of fruit were shipped East yesterday, as against 48 for the corresponding day last year.

Of the number, 13 cars were loaded with peaches, 1 with plums, 1 1/4 with grapes, 7 3/4 with pears and 1 with apples.

Chicago will get 10 cars, New York 9, Boston, New Orleans and Denver 2 each, Philadelphia, St. Louis, Kansas City and St. Paul 1 each, Minneapolis 3, and other points 2.

The cases against Frank Cook, charged with carrying concealed weapons and threats against the life of his wife, Emma, were continued in the Police Court yesterday morning until today, owing to the absence of important witnesses.

Divorce Granted.

Judge Johnson yesterday morning granted May Katzenstein a divorce from William H. Katzenstein. Katzenstein offered no opposition to the decree, and was ordered to pay \$30 a month alimony to the plaintiff, who was awarded the custody of the child.

Taken Under Adversement.

The case of Elizabeth R. Griffiths, asking for a divorce from O. W. Griffiths, was submitted on briefs in Judge Johnson's court yesterday morning, and taken under adversement.

Wants a Jury.

The case against W. T. Davis, charged with having violated the ordinance prohibiting peddling upon the business streets of the city, was further continued in the Police Court yesterday morning until Tuesday next. Davis will be tried by a jury.
