

ALVORD'S PROTEST IGNORED.

Middle-of-the-Road Democrats to Have a Place on the Ticket.

Populists Must File an Independent Certificate To-Day for De Vries.

The Bryan wing of the Democracy is seeking to prevent the Middle-of-the-Road Democrats from having a place on the State ballot for the next election.

"And thereby protest against and object to the filing of any certificate of nomination of Electors of President and Vice-President of the United States by any party or parties whatsoever that may contain a designation of the political principles, faith or belief of the party or parties offering to file said certificate."

THE PROTEST IGNORED.

Secretary of State Brown has made the following reply to Chairman Alvord's protest: "Your protest against the filing of any certificate of nomination of Electors by any party in which the words 'Democrat' occur, was duly received and filed."

DE VRIES' CHANCE.

The Populists, too, are after the Secretary of State to have his place on the ticket as their candidate for Congress in lieu of McGlashan, who has resigned.

MORE KICKERS.

But there is more. The Socialists want to be in the swim, but Secretary Brown has seen no evidence that they ever polled one-third of the votes in the State, and does not think they are entitled to a place on the ballot.
