WHEAT PRICES, BOTH SPOT AND FUTURE, LOWER.

Barley Steady at Unchanged Quotations—Trading in Oats Light, and Prices Firm.

San Francisco, Oct. 7th. Wheat has slumped again; quite a drop at Chicago; locally futures and spot prices have declined. Milling is offered more freely than shipping descriptions. A cargo in tow from Fort Coats to-day for export. Barley remains steady at unchanged prices. Oct receipts are light, trading is light, stocks on hand are light, and prices are firm as previously quoted. Very little corn has arrived thus far this week, and while the market is not active, prices remain firm. Berries did better to-day, the supply being light. Table Grapes, Peaches and fancy Pears are firm. Better figures are quoted for Grapes. Too many inferior, wormy Apples here. Cantaloupes are scarce and higher. Good Pigs are still scarce. Wine grapes are weak; receipts are liberal and sales slow. There are about enough Limes here for the demand; the next lot will be a small one, consisting of 500 boxes, to be here on the 11th inst.
