Railroad Employees' Address to Their Fellow-Workers.

What the Defeat of the Funding Bill Means to the People of Sacramento.

The Executive Committee of the Consolidated Railroad Shop Men's Sound Money Clubs held a meeting last night and discussed the political situation and decided to issue an address to the men in the employ of the Southern Pacific Company in this district.

The following address was finally decided upon: To the employees of the Southern Pacific Company: The local issues in this campaign affect the welfare, prosperity and future happiness of every laboring man in this community, and particularly the employes of the Southern Pacific Company.

The reason of this is because our employer, the Southern Pacific Company, is indebted to the United States in the sum of nearly \$70,000,000, for which, as security, the Government holds a second mortgage upon the railroad.

In case the proposition of the owners of the road is accepted, the United States will receive every dollar of the debt. The matter of permitting payment of this debt in installments has been embodied in a bill pending before Congress, and this is what is known as the "Funding Bill."
