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Weather Report. Northern California—Fair Friday; decidedly colder early Friday morning in northern and eastern portions; cooler in the southern portion Friday, and colder Saturday morning in extreme southern portion; northwesterly winds on the coast; light northerly winds inland; frosts Friday and Saturday mornings in the valleys.

THE ELECTORAL COLLEGE. From present indications it would seem that McKinley has received the popular vote of the electors of the Union, as well as over 200 in the Electoral College.

The percentages in the Electoral College since the foundation of the Union have been greatly varied. Washington was elected in 1789, the Electoral College having 73 votes, and Washington received 69 of them, a percentage of 94.52.

Adams in 1824 had 84 and Jackson 99, the vote being out of a college of 261 and resulting in no choice, the percentages being respectively 32.18 and 37.93. In 1828 Jackson had 178 votes out of 261, a percentage of 68.20.

In 1844 Polk had 170 out of 275, or 61.82. In 1848 Taylor had 163 out of 290, or 56.21. In 1852 Pierce, 254 out of 296, with the high percentage of 85.81.

The new President will go into office heavily burdened. He will find that for many months the Government has been running behind, its income not meeting its expenses; that there has been suspension of payments upon the public debt, and a great piling up of undischarged interest.

The people did hold it to be an issue; they did vote with that in mind; they did consider it of such importance that they approved the expression of the Republican platform upon that subject, and they did it in the teeth of the refusal of the Democracy to discuss it, pass upon the tariff matter in their own minds and act accordingly.

The woman suffrage amendment has been beaten by probably 50,000 or more votes. This will put this subject on the shelf for a considerable time, since the vote upon it after the six months' arduous labor of its advocates, the longest campaign in history, fully instructed the people upon its merits, and therefore it will scarcely be permitted that there shall be any resumption of the question at an early day.

President Cleveland has issued a proclamation for "Thanksgiving Day" in which he calls on the people to offer up thanks to God for the preservation of the republic and the deliverance of the nation from "threatened danger."
