

AS TO THE CITY CHARTER.

Long Session of the Amendment Committee.

These Outlines of Propositions—Opinions of Citizens Are Asked For.

The committee of the Trustees with the Citizens' Advisory Committee on Charter Amendments met last evening, Trustee Devine in the chair. Present: Messrs. Devine, Tozer, Weinstock, Devlin, Schaw, Coleman, Woodson and Clerk Desmond.

Several minor amendments were considered which have already been made public. One relating to publicity of ordinances was rejected; two others already reported in these columns were revised and approved.

The committee then took up and debated lengthily the outlines of three propositions given below, which are advertised in another column, for the purpose of eliciting expressions of opinion in writing, or at the meeting of the committee next Wednesday evening.

One puts all executive power in the hands of the Mayor, one makes the Mayor the agent of the Trustees and places most responsibility on the Trustees. Either of the two are intended to define the functions of the two branches of municipal government more clearly, and to avoid overhauling the whole Charter, if either is adopted, it will be added to the Charter to modify and construe it.

A fourth or general proposition will require more work of amendment and proposes a change in the form of government and the constitution of the Board of Trustees.

On these three the committee desires the people to express themselves that the committee may act advisedly. A fourth proposition is before the committee for debate, but has not yet been taken up. It proposes to make six wards out of the nine at present; to elect one Trustee from each ward and three at large, and to define the powers of the Mayor and Trustees as in either of propositions 1 or 2.

The following are the three propositions now submitted: "The committee of the Board of City Trustees, with the Advisory Committee, submit the following outlines of three propositions under consideration for interpretation and amendment of the charter, and desire expressions of opinion from citizens concerning the same in writing or before the committee, which meets again on the evening of the 18th inst.:

"Proposition 1, to define powers of Mayor and Trustees—The Board of Trustees shall have no power to employ men, purchase supplies, direct officers or exercise any executive power whatever except confirming appointees, but all executive power shall be lodged in the Mayor without interference or control by the Board of Trustees. All officers of the city shall be under the control and direction of the Mayor and shall report to him whenever and as often as he may require. The Board of Trustees shall provide by ordinance the method and condition to be observed by the Mayor in the purchase of supplies or performance of work. The Mayor shall transmit to the Board of Trustees any reports made to him when requested.

"Proposition 2, to define power of Mayor and Trustees—Except in relation to the appointment of officers whose confirmation is necessary by the Board of Trustees, the Mayor shall in all respects be subordinate to the Trustees, and shall comply with the orders of the board. He shall have no power to purchase supplies or enter into any contract without the consent of the board. He may be removed from office at any time in the manner prescribed by Section 25 hereof. The Board of Trustees shall have power by resolution to direct and control all officers appointed by the Mayor.

"Outline of General Proposition—There shall be six wards. One Trustee shall be elected from each ward, and one shall be elected at large, who shall be President of the board and Mayor. All power shall be lodged in this board, and the Mayor shall perform such duties as may be prescribed by the board. The Trustees shall receive \$50 per month, and the Mayor \$150 per month. All appointments shall be made by the board, the Mayor voting as a member of the Board of Trustees."


