SOVEREIGN'S APPEAL.

Mr. Sovereign, a chief of the order of the Knights of Labor, is out in a pitiful wail. According to his proclamation we are going to the bottomless pit post haste. Civil liberty is on the verge of ruin and human rights are threatened with disaster that, if it comes, will destroy the last vestige of freedom.

What miserable palaver this is to be sure. Sovereign does not echo the thought of the substantial artisans and workers of the country. With the ballot at their command they know that no harm can befall us if they do not will it. They know that capital is not so massed as to constitute the threat that Sovereign assumes to be impending.

Sovereign has a remedy—all these professional agitators have remedies at their tongue's end. He advises his order to take up the free silver cause and to battle for it from this time on; to mass against "Government by injunction" and enter upon a lot of other things of that order, and the more effectually to accomplish them, to stiffen the secrecy of the order and institute a new degree to be known as "Minute Men."

It will be interesting to watch the movements of the K. of L. during the next four years. If Mr. Sovereign has his way it will become a genuine free silver league fighting the very forces that make labor possible, instead of an organization to remedy some of the evils claimed to exist to injure labor. Now, when labor lifts its head in hope, Mr. Sovereign declares that the hard times have been a condition forced by the rich to injure labor and that closed factories and scarcity of money in circulation were conditions brought about by capital to enslave and coerce labor.

Let labor "clear the decks" for a dawn of prosperity. This will be far better. "Down with false gods!" should be the demand of organized labor.

The Cincinnati "Enquirer" is disposed to sneer at the recent accomplishment of American diplomacy in bringing on the arbitration of the Venezuelan question. The "Enquirer" is one of the defeated, and evidently proposes to do all it can as an obstructionist. It can see nothing in the achievement of the American Government worthy of pride or praise. It is unfortunate that political defeat leaves some men more the partisan than the patriot.

Spain has effected the loan to carry on the Cuban war by appealing to her people after falling among foreign bankers. It is charged that she accompanied the appeal by half-veiled threats. We do not so understand the proclamation. It refers to the embarrassment of the Government in strong terms, and sets out that failure to command the means necessary might involve Spain in domestic difficulties of gravest character.

The San Francisco "Examiner" is doing its utmost to stir up a sensation because of the criticism of the Portland "Oregonian" and the clergy and citizens who are voicing their protests through the columns of that paper are making a mountain out of a mole hill. The character of California society, happily, is not to be affected by the soured criticism of an Oregon newspaper, nor by its attempt to be witty at the expense of California morals.

If the Spanish Minister really made the remark credited to him that there is a possibility of war between the United States and Spain, he was indiscreet and violated the code that governs diplomats and the ministerial corps. Whatever his opinions upon the subject, it was a gross misconduct for him to utter them.

If Maceo carries out his threat to divide his armies into guerrilla groups and carry on the war after the manner of predatory bands of freebooters, he will weaken his cause among sympathetic people, though he may prolong the struggle and possibly wear Spain out in that manner. Guerrilla warfare is the most cruel and defenseless of any order of arms.

The sympathy of the "Record-Union" is extended to J. F. Lanthorn, editor and proprietor of the "News" of Red Bluff, whose office was destroyed by fire Tuesday night. We trust that the "News" will not suffer delay in its resuscitation because of this misfortune.

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views were not supported by the public at large, nor in the nature of things, by his party, and his efforts in advocacy of the reform were soon abandoned. WHO IS RESPONSIBLE? Oakland Enquirer: In some of the districts the news of the decision affirming the constitutionality of the Wright law is received with regret.

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


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
