

IMPORTANT TO DAIRYMEN.

Protection Against Adulteration of Butter and Cheese.

What the State Dairy Bureau Has to Report as to its Operations.

The first report of the State Dairy Bureau has been received by the Governor. The members of the bureau are L. Tomasini, Thomas Flint and George W. Burbank, and were appointed March 20, 1895, when they met, organized, and by resolution issued a circular to the press of the State, containing a notice to the public embodying the enforcement of the Act passing in this State, and that the revenue officers say they are not permitted to show the monthly statements without orders from headquarters.

In reply, you are informed that it is no part of the duty of a Collector, or Deputy Collector, nor are they authorized to give out information pertaining to internal revenue to applicants therefor. The only internal revenue record which there is any provision of law for opening to the public is the list of special tax payers. It is kept open for public inspection in the office of the Collector, and the Collector, nor any Deputy Collector, is allowed to make copies or give out information therefrom at the request of citizens.

If any person desires to obtain information from the list mentioned he can do so only by inspecting it himself, or sending some person to inspect it for him, and at times only when such inspection will not interfere with the proper transaction of the business of the office; the Collector's right to the record, in the necessary discharge of his official work, is paramount to the right of the public to inspect it. From the foregoing letter, the Internal Revenue Department at Washington assumes that the public, or any of its officers, have no right to know whether licensed dealers selling oleomargarine make their monthly statements required by law.

From the information the bureau can obtain there were sold, and consumed in the State of California from the 1st day of January, 1894, to the 1st day of March, 1895, a period of fourteen months, over 450,000 pounds of oleomargarine and butterine. Of this amount 390,000 pounds was manufactured in this State, and 150,000 pounds imported into the State. The unlimited sale of oleomargarine and butterine during that time was a loss to the dairy industry of this State of at least \$100,000.

Eighteen licenses were issued by the Internal Revenue Department for the sale of oleomargarine to dealers in this State from July 1, 1894, to December 1, 1894. Of these, seven were in San Francisco, seven in Los Angeles, one in San Jose, two in San Bernardino and one in Oakland.

From reports received by the bureau and other information, there was manufactured in this State for the year ending October 1, 1896, 6,383,130 pounds of cheese. The total valuation of the product was \$12,331,067.

Amount of Eastern butter received in the State for the year ending October 1, 1896, 608,200 pounds. The total cheese received for same time, 639,840 pounds.

The first creamery erected in the State of California was the Humboldt Creamery, near Ferndale, Humboldt County, in the year 1889. A few separators were used by individual dairymen before that time. The number of separators in this State for the year ending October 1, 1896, by separator process, 10,697,323 pounds of butter, and 21,508,117 pounds by the old dairy method. Total amount of butter manufactured in the State for the year ending October 1, 1896, was 31,065,440 pounds.

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money in the State instead of sending it East for the imported article. There is no reason why the dairymen of this State cannot make as good an article of cheese as there is made in the Eastern States, if they will study the science of cheese-making. It is a well-known fact that the cheese manufactured in this State, with very few exceptions, is rushed to market in a few weeks in a soft and poor condition. Such cheese will not compare for food value with properly made and well-cured cheese.

At the present time there is only a small amount of cheese manufactured in this State by what is known as the Cheddar process, while a large per cent. of Eastern cheese imported into the State is made by that process, and is not shipped to market until thoroughly cured, which takes at least six months from the time of manufacture.

There should be a law passed by the next Legislature, fixing a standard for cheese in this State, by requiring all manufacturers of cheese to procure an official brand from the State Dairy Bureau, and brand each and every cheese at the place of manufacture, and not to be used by any other person than the one receiving the same. Such a law, if passed, would be a protection to the dairymen of the State, by preventing cheese not made in this State from being sold for California cheese, and would also stimulate cheese manufacturers to make a standard article, and by so doing make a reputation for California cheese at home and abroad.
