

THE COUNTY LAW LIBRARY.

Secretary Anderson's Report as to Its Condition.

He Thinks the County Should Pay the Small Salary of the Librarian.

W. A. Anderson, Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the County Law Library, yesterday filed with the Supervisors the following report:

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors—Gentlemen: The Board of Sacramento County Law Library Trustees makes the following report, covering the time since the organization of the library.

Number of books on hand belonging to the library, 717; journals of the Assembly, 63; total amount of receipts of the Law Library fund since the organization of the library, \$3,394; total amount paid out for books, \$2,003 05; total amount paid out for librarian, \$970; total amount paid out for incidental expenses, \$94 61.

On the advent of the two new Superior Judges the Board of Library Trustees will be changed to that extent. Judges E. C. Hart and J. W. Hughes will on the 1st of January become members of the board, in place of Hon. A. P. Catlin and Hon. A. C. Hinkson, and the Board of Trustees will consist of the following members: Hon. Matt. F. Johnson, Hon. E. C. Hart, Hon. J. W. Hughes, W. A. Anderson, J. M. Morrison and Frank D. Ryan.

There can be no doubt of the great value of the County Law Library to the courts and the profession, and it will be only a matter of time when we will have one of the best law libraries in the State.

There has never been any tax imposed on the members of the bar for the increase of the library, although it might be advisable to levy a small amount on each member, at least for a year, in order that we can be able to secure some new and valuable additions to the library.

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LOUIE GOON GOES FREE.

The Evidence Would Not Convict Him of Vagrancy.

Louie Goon was charged in the Police Court yesterday with being a vagrant. Officers Higgins and Nagle testified that he hung around the gambling-houses at Fourth and I streets, apparently acting as lookout to warn the gamblers of the approach of the police.

Officers Douglas and Hardy testified to the same effect. E. C. Hart, Goon's attorney, argued that there was no element of vagrancy shown. The presence of a police officer is terrifying to a foreigner and the Chinese have a high respect for the officers, and Goon probably went into the house and shut the door under the influence of that feeling whenever the officers came along.

The barometer is quite high and ought to mean heavy and killing frosts, but yesterday was the warmest day this month so far, and the frosts observed were very light ones.
