

NEW PUBLICATIONS.

The fifty-fifth volume of the "Outlook" (New York) begins with the first of January, 1897. The new departure which the "Outlook" made a year ago in becoming a weekly newspaper and an illustrated monthly magazine in one has met with the most cordial approval on the part of all readers, and has greatly added to the popularity and the circulation of the paper.

"Godey's Magazine" for December (New York) is nicely illustrated. The leading features are: Frontispiece, "The Adoration of the Shepherds" (from the painting by Gherardo della Notta); "The First Christmas," Frederic Reddall; "American Woman Harpists," V. Robard; "Bret Hart's 'Sue on the Stage,'" Beaumont Fletcher; "Art and Fashion in Dinner Giving," Grace E. Drew; "A Hard Times Christmas," Rupert Hughes; "Her Cobra Lover," William Alexander Fraser; "The Santa Claus of the Midland Railway," Clarence Herbert New; "The Repentance of Amos Loveday," Kenneth Lee; "Talks by Successful Women," Alice Severance; "Benjamin Franklin," George C. Lay; "Music in America," Rupert Hughes; "To Forgive Divine" (fiction), Mary F. Nixon; "In Excessis Gloria" (a Christmas carol), Homer N. Bartlett; "Fashion, Fact and Fancy," Countess Annie de Montaigne.

A. S. Barnes & Co. (New York) publish "The Externals of Modern New York," by Mrs. Burton Harrison (110 pages, small quarto, cloth, gilt top, one volume, \$3), a beautifully illustrated book on fine paper with embossed cover. In it the author tells the story of the last fifth of a century by "thumb nail" sketches of the various departments of the city's work, and by a brief summary of progress in social development.

They also publish a new edition of the "History of the City of New York," by Mrs. Martha J. Lamb, three volumes, cloth, \$15, containing the chapter on "The Externals of Modern New York," by Mrs. Harrison.

Announcement is made by the Critic Company (287 Fourth avenue, New York) that it is about to begin the publication of a literary magazine to be called "The Month—Literature, Art and Life." It will be edited by Joseph B. Glider and Jeannette L. Glider, editors of the "Critic," and will be made up, in part, of matter that has appeared in the weekly issues of that journal. There will be about one hundred pages of reading matter and illustrations, and a buff cover printed in black and red. The "Month" will be a journal of criticism, independent in its point of view and vigorous in its treatment of men and books. By a combination of circumstances, it has been possible to make the price extremely low, \$1 a year.

The "Cosmopolitan" for December (New York) is a notable number for the richness and profuseness of its illustrations.
