

COMMERCIAL.

SPOT WHEAT IS UNCHANGED, BUT DULL AND WEAK.

No changes in Barley, But the Market is Quiet and Weak—No Change in Oats.

San Francisco, Dec. 18th. Spot Wheat is unchanged, but dull and weak; futures are quiet and lower. The Chicago market is in an unsettled condition, bobbing up and down. A part cargo is down from Port Costa for Sydney.

Barrel Apples are lower, but boxes are sustained. Continued drag on Grapes. Oranges are weaker for Navel. Some poor Mandarin Oranges by the northern route sell considerably below the quotations.

Butter has further declined and is weak at that. Dairies are particularly weak. No change in Cheese. Eggs are weak and dragging, and our top figures for California are extreme.
