SUPREME COURT DECISIONS.

SYLLABUS.

(S. F. No. 310—Department One—Filed December 31, 1896.) S. G. Wright, appellant; Del Norte County, respondent. Compensation for services as member of County Board of Education.

(S. F. No. 302—Department One—Filed December 31, 1896.) A. A. Burke, appellant; George McCowen, respondent. Ejectment. Affirmed.

A map is intended to represent the relative situation of localities of lots, as regarding each other, the actual survey is the practical location, and although the patents do not specially refer to the field book and the actual survey of the lots, they virtually refer to them by referring to the map.

(S. F. No. 476—Department One—Filed December 31, 1896.) Mary Carlson, appellant; Supreme Council American Legion of Honor, respondent. Recovery upon benefit certificate. Affirmed.

Mutual benefit societies have no practical means of meeting their frequently recurring obligations, except by the prompt collection of assessments upon members, and it has been found necessary to adopt stringent means to enforce their prompt payment.

(S. F. No. 339—Department One—Filed December 31, 1896.) Charles S. Van Horn, appellant; Ricks Water Company, respondent. Action to recover reward. Judgment of demurrer affirmed.

Where a person is employed as a watchman to detect offenses, his employers also offering a reward for the arrest and prosecution of offenders, and he prosecutes an offender without informing his employers of the commission of the offense, and after the conviction of the offender, his employers informing them of the commission of the offense, he cannot claim both the compensation and the reward for reporting the offense; and, if he cannot do that, he cannot entitle himself to the reward by an arrest and conviction after he has received compensation for detecting and reporting the offense.

(S. F. No. 479—Department One—Filed December 31, 1896.) J. P. E. Heintz, respondent; J. B. H. Cooper, appellant. Recovery for services as physician and surgeon. Affirmed.

Where findings by reference to the pleadings, or parts thereof, involve uncertainty as to what facts are found, they are uniformly held insufficient; but where they do show what facts are found, and there is no uncertainty about them, they are sustained.

(S. F. No. 478—Department One—Filed December 31, 1896.) Henry A. Hardin, appellant; H. G. Sin Claire et al., respondents. Abatement of an obstruction and injunction. Reversed.

Where a person owns a right of way, and it has been obstructed, the obstruction is not a nuisance, and no person creating or assisting in its creation, maintain the nuisance is liable to be sued for its abatement and for damages. Whether the obstructor is or is not an owner, lessee or tenant of the land on which the obstruction is made, is immaterial.

Administrators have no right to maintain an obstruction to a private way, to the detriment of the owner thereof, notwithstanding it has been placed there by the decedent, of whose estate they are administrators.

(S. F. No. 468—Department One—Filed December 31, 1896.) F. P. Howard, respondent; Oakland Consolidated Street Railway Company and Consolidated Piedmont Cable Company, defendants; Oakland Consolidated Street Railway Company, appellant. Damages for personal injuries. Reversed.

It is improper for a Judge in denying a motion to strike out certain testimony, to suggest that the testimony may "stand for what it is worth." The expression is liable to be taken by the jury as an instruction that in the opinion of the court the evidence is of little consequence, and it is proper to refrain from the consideration of a jury of the evidence is to be weighed solely by the latter.

Where the opinion of an expert is asked upon facts not detailed in the question itself, testimony is not admissible, and the witness is referred to the facts of another for such facts, it should appear that the witness has heard the testimony.

An ordinary horse-car is not run or controlled by any such intricate force or mechanism as an electric, steam or cable car, and a question, therefore, as to whether the car could have been stopped to avoid the collision does not fall within the rule involving the skill or experience of an expert.
